SOME OLD SONGS.

(Philadelphia Ledger.)

The death of Lady John Scott
Spottiswoode, who composed the
music of "Annie Laurie" and other
melodies, recalls many of the old-time
songs of sentiment with which our
mothers charmed the beaux and
chevaliers of their day and generation.
She was 91 years of age. In noting the
passing of this venerable lady, who
was a golden link connecting the past
with the present, it may be a matter
of interest to recall some of the
melodies of the olden time that lent
such tender charm to home

"When the hours of day were number-
ed

And the voices of the night
Woke the better soul that slumbered
To a holy, calm delight."

Among such melodies there is more
exquisite than "Annie Laurie," the
poem with which Lady Scott's name
will always be associated. Scarcely
less beautiful are such songs of sentiment
as "Highland Mary," by Robert
Burns, and those two other sweet
melodies, "Coming thro' the Rye" and
"We'd Better Bide a Wee." Of other
famous old ballads there are "Auld
Robin Gray," "Douglas, Tender and
True," "Gypsy Maiden," "Juanita,"
"Then You'll Remember Me," "Swa-
nee River," "In days of old, When
Knights Were Bold," "In the Gloam-
ing," and "Lily Dale," of which a very
amusing parody was written, entitled
"Billy Dale."

Some of these old songs were inspir-
ed by a peculiarly tender sentiment.
What could display filial piety more
divinely than "We'd Better Bide a
Wee?" As the story goes, this was
composed by a Scotch lassie who met
the plea of her ardent lover with the
noble sentiment that her first duty was
to her aged parents. What a tender
appeal is made to the experience of
most readers by the mere mention of
such gems of the heart as "The Last
Link is Broken that Binds Me to
Thee," "Won't You Tell Me Why
Robin?" and "When You and I were
Young, Maggie."

Next to Burns as a author of ex-
quisite songs of sentiment was Tom
Moore. Among his most favorite songs
that still survive are "Oft in the Silly
Night," "Origin of the Harp," "Twas
Ever thus From Childhood's Hour,"
"The Harp That Once Thro' Tara's
Halls," "Believe Me, if All Those
Ereaching Young Charms," etc. There
are many modern songs of less fame,
such as "When I Saw Sweet Nellie
Home," "Her Bright Smile Haunts
Me Still" and, coming down to a
still later date, "Sweet Marie" is one
of the most popular.

Many of the famous ballads have
been composed by the fair sex. In
the field of poetic sentiment, at least,
she has proved a dangerous rival of
man. The charming ballad "In the
Gloaming" owes its birth to Lady
Arthur Hill, and Hon. Mrs. Elizabeth
Morton was the proud mother of the
languorous melody "Juanita," while
"Douglas, Tender and True," was

the happy offspring of Lady Scott
Gattie. "Maryland, My Maryland,"
owed the thrill of its spirited tune to a
woman, the late Mrs. Newell Martin,
of Baltimore. The musical pathos of
"Auld Robin Gray" originated in the
brain of Lady Ann Lindsay. Mrs.
Fitzgerald was responsible for the
melody "I Remember, I Remember,"
and it was a woman who wrote the
words to "Rocked in the Cradle of the
Deep." Lady Nairne, a charming
Scotchwoman, has contributed two
songs that need only to be sung in
any clime to cause every wearer of the
tartan to throw his plaid cap to the
breeze. These are "The Campbells
Are Coming" and "The Land o' the
Leal."

Official despatches from Shanghai ex-
plain that the Hankow uprising was
not due to the Boxers, but was a plot
organized by the partisans of Kang Yu
Wei, the reformer, combined with the
secret society known as the Ko-Lao-
Hui, and anti-foreign organization,
who proposed to the southern viceroy
at Hankow, for arms, gun-powder and
other agents of destruction.

A proclamation, written in English
and addressed to Europeans, was
seized. In it the revolutionists de-
clared themselves opposed to the
Manchu dynasty, but ready to uphold
the present Emperor. They expressed
themselves as desirous of founding a
"Constitutional Government," of "pro-
tecting foreigners and Christians and
of supporting the powers against anti-
foreign fanatics."

It is said in Washington administra-
tion circles that in the event of the
ability of the powers to agree upon a
Chinese policy, that will preserve the
integrity of the Empire, the plan most
likely to be adopted will provide for
international administration of the
customs service. Under this plan
representatives of the several allied
powers having forces on Chinese soil
will be stationed at all the customs
ports of China to supervise or admin-
ister the service and watch the re-
venues with a view to the ensuring the
collections of the enormous indemnity
that will be individually demanded by
each of the Governments. It is un-
derstood that this or some joint super-
visory scheme of a similar character
will be favoured by this government and
while other governments may make
other proposals for future policy of a
different nature there is no informa-
tion in the possession of the United
States Government to indicate inhar-
monious action on such supervisory
plan.

A Reuter despatch dated Pekin,
August 15, and sent by post to
Shanghai, describes scenes of appal-
ling desolation and wanton destruction
in Legation street. All the houses of
foreigners were riddled with shells,
burned or blown up. An attempt was

made to mine the American Legation.
A shaft was sunk from the top of the
wall fifteen feet deep, and was then
continued as a tunnel with a sharp
slope in the direction of the Legation.
Apparently the Chinese did not have
time to finish it.
