ton.

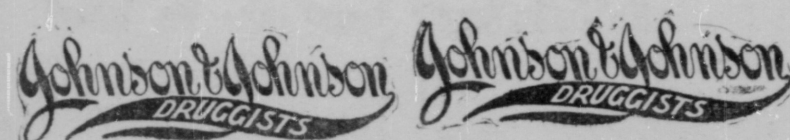

## Local and Other Items.

THE MAILS.—The mails left Tormentine  
this morning at a quarter to eight and  
reached town shortly before one.

HICCOUGHED TO DEATH.—At Macoutgub,  
Ill., Casper Schiller is dead after a spell  
of hiccoughing lasting six days. He  
literally hiccoughed himself to death. He  
was 59 years of age.

CRAPAUD CREAMERY.—The annual  
meeting of the Crapaud Creamery Co, was  
held on Tuesday the 31st January, and

Wright and Joseph McDonald.

AT IT AGAIN.—Word comes from Mon-  
treal that Sir William McDonald has  
handed the treasurer of McGill university  
a check for \$171,250 to make up the  
estimated amount necessary to endow the  
McDonald Building of Chemistry and  
Mining. This will bring up the gifts of  
Sir William to the University to something  
like \$2,620,000.

DIED AT THE HOSPITAL.—We announce  
to-day, with regret, the death of Mr. John  
Smith, a respected resident of Kelly's  
Cross, which occurred at the Charlott-  
town Hospital yesterday morning. His  
body was to-day taken to his home at  
Maplewood, Lot 29, and the funeral will  
leave to-morrow morning at 9.30 o'clock  
for St. Joseph's church. Mr. Smith was  
about 41 years of age. He leaves a wife  
and large family to whom the sympathy  
of all will go out.

PURPLE-STAMPED ENVELOPES.—Accord-  
ing to an Ottawa despatch the withdrawal  
of the purple two cent stamped envelopes  
of which the issue was limited, has caused  
a great demand for it, stamp speculators  
managed to capture nearly the entire issue,  
and in order to stop the speculation and  
give the general public a chance to pur-  
chase it, the postmaster-general has been  
urged to continue the issue of the purple,  
stamp envelopes until a given date, say  
the 1st of July. The matter is under con-  
sideration.

DEATH OF MRS. CURRIE.—The funeral  
of Mrs. J. K. Currie, wife of Mr. John R.  
Currie, principal of Currie's Business Col-  
lege, St. John, took place in that city last  
week and was largely attended. There  
were a great many floral tributes sent in  
prominent among them being a large, harp  
standing four feet high and having a broken  
string, the gift of the students of the  
college. Mr. Currie is a son of Mr. L.  
Currie, of Little Sands, and has many rela-  
tives and friends in this province who will  
sympathize with him in the great loss  
which is his.

A MILD WINTER IN THE NORTH WEST.—  
The Medicine Hat News of Jan. 26th, says:  
"About half an inch of snow fell last  
night. It was much needed on the prairies  
to furnish the stock with drink, the  
creeks and water holes being frozen over.  
A couple of inches of snow would do  
good, rather than harm, now. The past  
week, up to last night, has been mild,  
with warm and open weather.

The same paper also says that at the  
Medicine Hat Ranch the stock generally  
is in better condition than ever before at  
this season of the year.

A VALUABLE DISCOVERY.—A chemical  
substance which, by contact with the at-  
mosphere, clears vitiated air of all impure  
gases produced by respiration, and refur-  
nishes automatically the requisite quantity  
of oxygen, to make a respirable air, has  
been discovered by M. George S. Jaubert,  
and the discovery announced in the  
French Academy of Medicine. He was  
experimenting to renew air in a diving bell.  
His hypothesis was that 79 per cent. of the  
oxygen contained in respirable air remains  
intact after 21 per cent. of the oxygen has  
been consumed, and the same nitrogen,  
mixed with a new supply of oxygen, be-  
comes respirable air when the carbonic  
acid and the vapor produced by breathing  
are removed. This hypothesis he found  
to be correct, manufactured the chemical  
substance to clear the impure gases and  
supply the oxygen, and so solved his prob-  
lem. He states that six or eight pounds  
of this substance will enable a man to live  
for 24 hours in a diving bell.

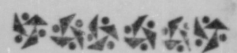
