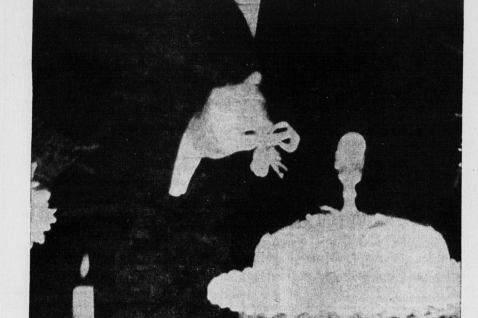

Rev. Gaudet Celebrates 25 Years in Priesthood

Rev. J. Alphonse Gaudet, O.M.I., St. Albert, Alberta, celebrated 25 years in the priesthood on May 25th. Born in Tignish 61 years ago the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Agapue Gaudet, he completed his primary education in Tignish.

He later attended Mount Laurier in Quebec where he obtained his degree in Philosophy prior to his entering the oblate order he taught school for two years in Alberta.

He was ordained in Edmonton, Alberta by Bishop Pallazani on May 28, 1939. 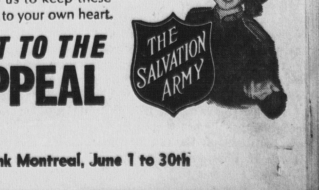
