Beaten Eggs Seasoned In Unbeatable Omelets

ALMOST all nations have a special version of the omelet - the Italian Frittata, the German Eierkuchen, the Spanish Tortilla - but in most countries the French omelet has become part of the cuisine. When finished, the entire omelet should be smooth and soft for an authentic French omelet is really nothing more or less than scrambled eggs enclosed in a thin blanket of coagulating slightly cooked egg. It is served plain as is, with a suitable accompaniment of a green vegetable or potatoes sautee or often with a filling as suggested today. A sprig of parsley is the usual refreshing touch of green. FRENCH OMELET for breakfast, brunch, luncheon or a light and easy dinner entrée. 6 eggs, 4 tbsp water, 1 tsp salt

OMELET WITH TOMATOES: Just before folding, spread a French omelet with enough peeled tomatoes cut in small pieces to make 1 c. Heat in 1 1/2 tsp butter, add 1 tsp seasoned salt.

CHEESE OMELET: Before folding, dust a French omelet with 1/4 c. grated sharp American or Parmesan cheese.

SWEET OMELET Sweet omelets are served as dessert after an otherwise light dinner, or for a ladies' luncheon as a main course and dessert combined. To Prepare: Spread plain French omelet with jelly, jam or preserves before folding. Also dust with grated coconut or chopped nuts if desired.

TOMORROW'S DINNER Oyster Stew New England Style Hot Potato - Bacon-Egg Salad - with Bacon Curried Sprouts Warm Deep-Dish Apple - Raisin Pie with or without Ice Cream or Hard Sauce Coffee or Tea Milk

HOT POTATO - BACON-EGG SALAD 2 lb. small potatoes (preferably new) 6 (tbsp) chopped green onion. Including tender portion of green tops 4 slices bacon cut in 1/2" squares 3 tbsp. cider vinegar 1 tsp. sugar 2 fine - chopped warm hard-cooked eggs 12 slices crisp cooked bacon, additional 3 c. hot buttered Brussels sprouts Boil potatoes, drain, peel and dice. At once, add onion with green tops. Keep warm. Slow - fry bacon squares until crisp; do not drain. Mix in vinegar and sugar. Stir into warm potato mixture. Slow-cook over low heat or in double-boiler until very hot. With fork, mix in chopped hard - cooked eggs. Heap on heated platter, border with crisp cooked bacon.
