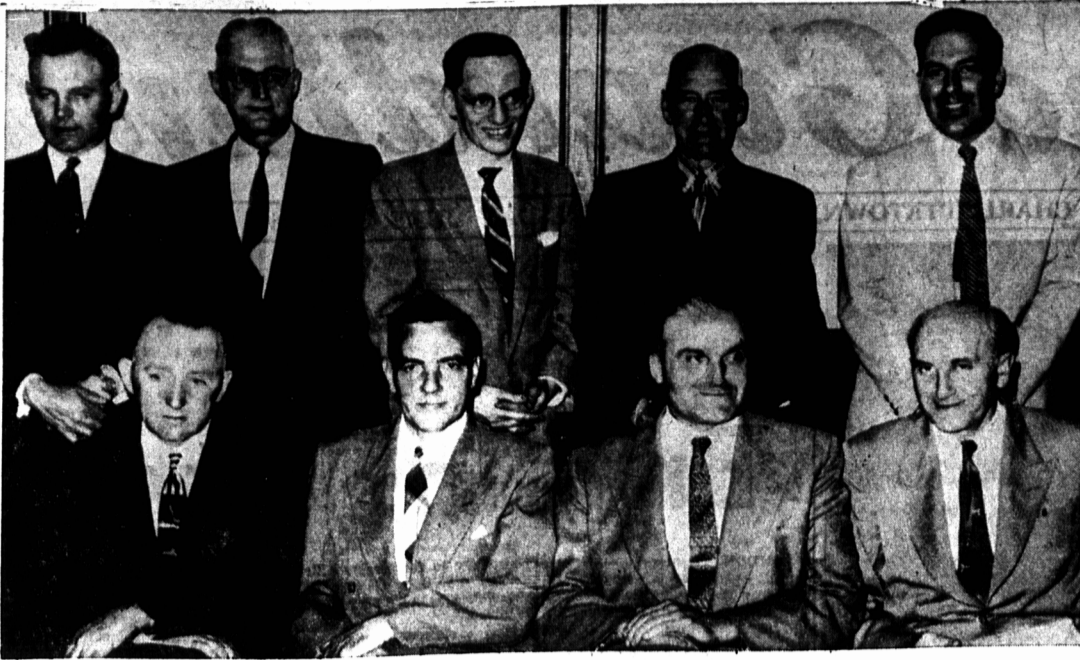

Reviews Apiary Projects At Experimental Farm

Dr. C. A. Jamieson, Chief of the Apiary Division, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, spent two days at the Experimental Farm, Charlottetown, reviewing with the Superintendent, Mr. R. C. P. rent, and the Apiarist, Mr. W. A. Burns, the various projects under study here.

Four main projects are being dealt with, as follows: 1. Studies on the Control of Nosema Disease with Fumagillin (an antibiotic); 2. Hybrid Stock Testing; 3. Package Bee Management Problems; 4. Effect of Bees on Fertilization and Set of Cucumbers.

For these various experiments 50 colonies of bees are used. These are located at the Experimental Farm headquarters, Uplon Farm, and at an out-Apiary at Cornwall.

Request Urgent U.N. Session On Algerian Issue

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—A majority of the powerful Asian-African group in the UN Tuesday approved a request for an urgent session of the Security Council on the Algerian-French conflict.

The group's members acknowledged privately they did not have enough votes on the council to win consideration. Seven of the 11 members must support a measure to get it on the agenda.

Swept on by pressure from all of the Arab countries for recourse to the UN, these 13 members agreed to sign the request: Afghanistan, Egypt, Indonesia, Iran, Iraq, Jordan, Lebanon, Libya, Pakistan, Saudi Arabia, Syria, Thailand and

Much Damage Reported To Strawberry Plants

Mr. Winston Smith, Provincial Horticulturist of the Department of Agriculture yesterday said that the heavy frost of last Friday night caused considerable damage throughout the Province among strawberry plants. The loss involved will probably be from 25 to 50 per cent on first year plants and up to 75 per cent among older plants which had not been covered during the past winter. The variety suffering the most damage was the Senator Dunlap with the later varieties such as the Sparkle not being damaged so heavily, about 15 per cent. The damage, said Mr. Smith, will probably result in a serious reduction in this season's crop.

Among other crops any tomatoes that were not protected were about 75 per cent destroyed and in a number of areas, beans and other tender vegetables were also severely cut by the unseasonal frost. The fruits suffered some damage but it is not possible to determine the exact extent to which this will run.

Mr. W. A. Burns, Dominion Weather Observer at the Experimental Farm reported that this was the latest June frost observed since records were first started in 1910. Last Friday night the air temperature dropped to 31 degrees while the ground temperature was in the vicinity of 24 degrees, the lowest previous air temperature recorded in June was 32.

Dispute In U.S. Navy Over Zippers

United States Navy has put it up to Secretary Charles S. Thomas to referee the dispute over zippers vs buttons on sailors' pants.

In 1948 the service officially outlawed the "broad-fall front" garments with their traditional 13 buttons—a style deriving from seagoing gear of the 18th century.

In place of the "broad-fall front" the navy decreed a fly-front with zipper.

But the order permitted the men to continue to wear the old-style uniforms until they wore out. Many of the uniforms apparently have survived all those eight years and are still in use by traditional-minded tars.

St. Pius X Patron Of New Parkdale Church

The patron of the new Roman Catholic Church at Parkdale is St. Pius X. It was announced last night by Right Rev. R. V. MacKenzie, pastor of the newly formed parish.

St. Pius X has been designated in Church history as "The Pope of the Eucharist." During his reign as Sovereign Pontiff he urged the practice of frequent, and if possible daily reception of Holy Communion.

He was born in Italy of poor parents and was ordained to the

Priesthood at an early age. His brilliant mind and saintly character soon earned him many outstanding ecclesiastical honors.

He died in 1'4 broken hearted over the outbreak of the First World War.

Father MacKenzie also announced last night that a parish committee for Parkdale had been appointed. This committee will meet in the near future to complete their membership and initiate undertakings for the formation of the new parish.

The 40-year-old singer had been accused of being involved in an early morning fracas in a Harlem bar on Jan. 31 in which James R. Jackson, a boxing trainer, was shot and wounded.

The dismissals clear Daniels of all charges. District Attorney Frank S. Hogan said the ruling will be appealed.

ONTARIO FOREST FIRES

TORONTO (CP)—The forestry department said Tuesday 55 forest fires are being fought in Ontario 10 of which are not under control.
