Chicago White Sox Sign New Team Manager

CHICAGO, Oct. 10 — (AP) — Chicago White Sox today announced signing of Paul Richards, Seattle pilot in the Pacific Coast League, to a two-year contract as manager of the Pale Hose.

Richards, a Texan, replaced John (Red) Corriden, who became a "fill-in" pilot last May when the White Sox fired Jack Onslow.

Richards, 41, managed three minor league clubs, but this is the first major league managerial assignment for the former catcher of Detroit Tigers. He was a Tiger player-coach from 1943 through 1946.

His White Sox salary was not disclosed.

Richards' Seattle club finished sixth in the Pacific Coast League. He managed Atlanta of the Southern Association five years from 1938 through 1942. He won two pennants and finished second and won one post-season playoff in that span.

In 1947-48, Richards managed Buffalo of the International League, winning the circuit pennant in 1949.

"I thought it was just a sprain," he said.

Seminick, who made two hits in the series swept by the New York Yankees with four straight victories, said he'd probably have to wear the cast at least a month.

Famous N. H. L. Goalie Fatally Injured In Crash

GRAVENHURST, Ont., Oct. 10 — (CP) — Fate finally slipped one past George Hainsworth, the mighty little goaltender whose name ranks high on the list of hockey's all-time greats.

The stocky, 55-year-old retired star died Monday night in a collision between his automobile and a panel truck near here. Several broken ribs punctured the fighting heart that carried its owner to two of hockey's most amazing records and three awards as its best goalie.

Also injured in the accident were his wife, Alma, head cuts; Norman Hoover, 26, of Bracebridge driver of the truck, bruises; Teresa Thompson, Bracebridge, and Cecilia Blackwell, Toronto, minor injuries.

Hainsworth, a native of Thorndike, Ontario, was a member of the Canadiens when they won two straight Stanley Cup championships in 1930 and 1931. He finally gave up the game when a youngster named Walter (Turk) Broda came out of the west to dislodge him for keeps from his place on the Maple Leafs in 1936. He came to Toronto in a trade for the late Lorne Chabot, also a goalie.

Hainsworth played briefly with the Canadiens again, but time had taken its toll.

Hainsworth's professional hockey career began in 1921 when he was signed by Saskatoon Sheikhs after a brilliant amateur record with Kitchener Juniors. He made the big top in 1928 with Canadiens.

Red Wings And Rangers To Open National Hockey League Schedule Tonight

 The mammoth 1950-51 National Hockey League schedule opens at the Detroit Olympia Wednesday night, scene of the Red Wings 7-1 victory over the league All-Stars Sunday.

Detroit starts the 70-game-a-team grind against New York Rangers, who will show up with a new coach, Neil Colville, a former star forward who last year coached Rangers' New Haven farm club.

Red Wings open their season a stronger club, on paper at least, than the team that swept through the Stanley Cup finals last year.

In a big off-season player trade with Chicago Black Hawks they picked up Metro Prystay, high-scoring centre who got a goal and two assists in the all-star game, his first in Red Wings uniform.

Wings also added 21-year-old Terry Sawchuk, a sensational goaltender, who came up from Detroit's farm club at Indianapolis.

In other scheduled games this week, Chicago plays at Montreal Thursday and Toronto Saturday and Boston Bruins visit Montreal Saturday.

Bruins play their first home game Sunday against Canadiens, Chicago opens at home against Rangers Sunday and New York's first home tilt is Oct. 29 against Montreal.

For the first time in years, the season will open without the bracing body checks of Bill Ezinicki. He was sent down to the minors Tuesday night after finally reporting to Toronto Maple Leafs.

Ezinicki said he lost 20 pounds after playing in the Ontario open golf tournament in August. He wired Leafs he wasn't feeling up to par and was staying home until he felt better.

General manager Conn Smythe sent him down to Pittsburgh Hornets, Toronto's American Hockey League farm club — at a minor league salary — for a training period. Smythe said: "It's up to him how long he stays in the minors. He could be back in about 10 days as we need an extra forward."

Buying or selling American dollars may be a small transaction or a large one, but small or large its effect reaches out into the money markets of the world.

Here, in brief, is what happens: You go to a bank, which, in Canada, means a branch of a bank if the amount is not too large your branch will buy or sell with you immediately.

Let us say that the American dollar is being quoted at five-per-cent premium. Then, if you are buying \$100 American, you will pay \$105 for Canadian; and if you are selling \$100 American, you will get \$105 Canadian.

The rate varies from day to day.
