Contract Bridge

A MARKED LINE OF PLAY

The great flaw in the line of play South chose in today's deal was that it ignored a significant bid made by an opponent.

South dealer. North-South vulnerable.

♠ A 9 8 6	♥ K J	♦ K J 10 5	♣ 7 4 3
♠ K J 10	♥ 7 2	♦ 4 3 2	♣ 4
♠ A 8	♥ 5	♦ A Q 8 7 3 2	♣ A Q 7

The bidding:

South	West	North	East
1 ♠	1 ♠	3 ♠	Pass
4 NT	Pass	5 ♠	Pass
6 ♠	Pass	Pass	Pass

As far as the bidding was concerned, South was on solid ground. His Blackwood four notrump was quite proper after North showed the strength for a double raise, because with his own seven card suit thus "solidified," South's hand became distinctly "slammin'." South was also correct in not going on with the Blackwood five notrump when North announced one ace. If five notrump elicited a bid of six hearts, showing two kings, South would either have to bid an unwieldy six notrump, which might confuse the issue, or land at an extremely risky grand-slam contract at diamonds. The small slam was the proper bid.

West opened a heart. Declarer drew trumps and, obviously feeling that nothing could be hoped for in the spade suit, took the club ruff. It lost, and South soon had to concede a second loser in clubs.

The mere fact that West had overcalled with one spade should have given South the key to the winning play. Presumably, West had at least five spades, and that was all there was to it. South, after drawing trumps, should have cashed his second heart trick, led a spade to the ace and ruffed a spade, then returned to a diamond on the board and ruffed a second spade. Now he should simply go back to the board with the trump and lead and pass the last spade, throwing off his club five. This would end-play West very securely!

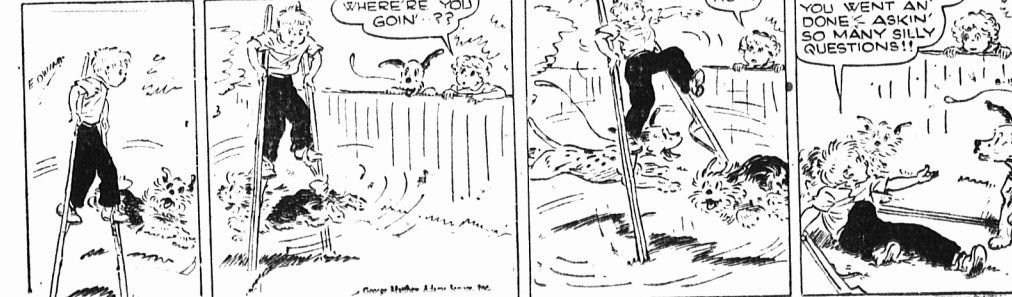

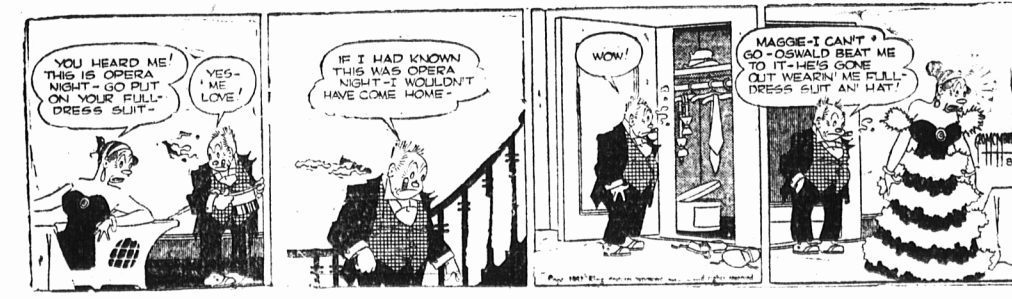

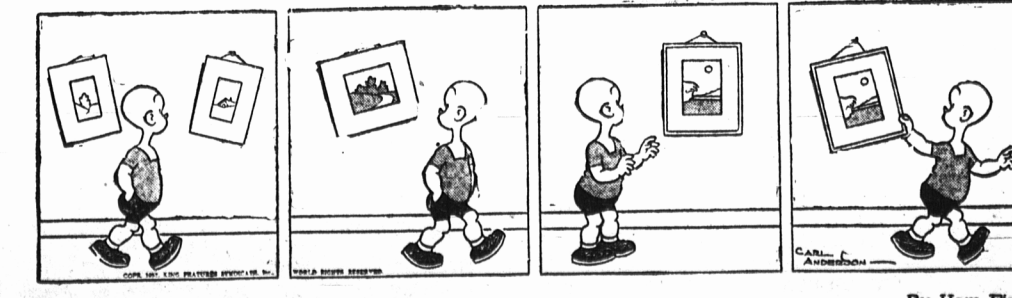
