Detachments Investigate Rash Of Weekend Accidents

SUMMERSIDE — Both the Borden and Summerside RCMP detachments investigated a number of accidents over the weekend. Three persons involved in accidents investigated by the Summerside Detachment were taken to hospital.

Early yesterday a Summerside man, Glorice Blaquiere, driving a late model car, went

off the road near the Legion Home in Miscouche. The vehicle received only slight damage and the driver was shaken up. He was attended by Dr. S.R. Cameron who stated Mr. Blaquiere had suffered no injuries. At approximately 4.45 yesterday afternoon there was a two-car collision at New Annan involving two 1965 model vehicles. Both vehicles sustained considerable damage and two occupants of one vehicle were taken to hospital.

Edward McGowan of Malpeque, who was attended by Dr. Cameron, was treated for facial lacerations and released. The other injured man, William DeLaney of Kensington, was attended by Dr. L.K. Zielinski for an injured shoulder and facial lacerations. He was kept in hospital.

The Borden Detachment investigated three accidents. Saturday afternoon a 1963 model car driven by Robert Angus Walker of the local RCAF station sustained damage estimated at \$180 when it struck a parked three-ton truck owned by William Elmer Chappel of Broadbalt. The accident occurred as Walker was turning his vehicle at Crapaud.

Saturday evening a 1958 model car driven by Margaret May Crooks of Summerside was in collision with a 1958 model driven by Donald Gordon Woodbridge of Charlottetown at the intersection of the Kings and Freetown roads. Total damage was estimated at \$375.

expressed belief he must have in mind a meeting to discuss a political settlement after the fighting has stopped.

Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko was due in New York late Sunday to attend the 20th session of the UN General Assembly and one report said Soviet Ambassador Nikolai T. Fedorenko wanted to consult him on the latest situation before giving his final assent to a resolution.

The plan, as drafted, does not go as far as UN Secretary-General U Thant suggested to the council Friday. At that time Thant proposed that the council issue a binding ceasefire order backed by threats of economic and military reprisals in the event of failure to comply.

The text, presented by Netherlands Ambassador J. G. De Beus, did not specifically mention possible sanctions but it would give the two governments 72 hours to end the fighting and would leave it up to the council to take the next steps. These could be either economic or military penalties, or both.

The actual deadline for the ceasefire would be 72 hours from the hour the council adopted the resolution.

WARN CHINA

Another key provision of the proposal would tell China directly to keep out of the conflict. The "Peking government" was not mentioned specifically, but the draft provides that the council call on "all states to refrain from any action which might aggravate the situation in the area."

The pressure was eased to some extent by Peking's announcement that it was extending until midnight Wednesday night (Peking time) the expiration of an ultimatum for dismantling fortifications on the Tibet-Sikkim border. The original deadline would have expired Sunday night.

De Beus was asked whether he believed there would be agreement on a final text Sunday night. He replied "we hope there will be agreement before midnight."

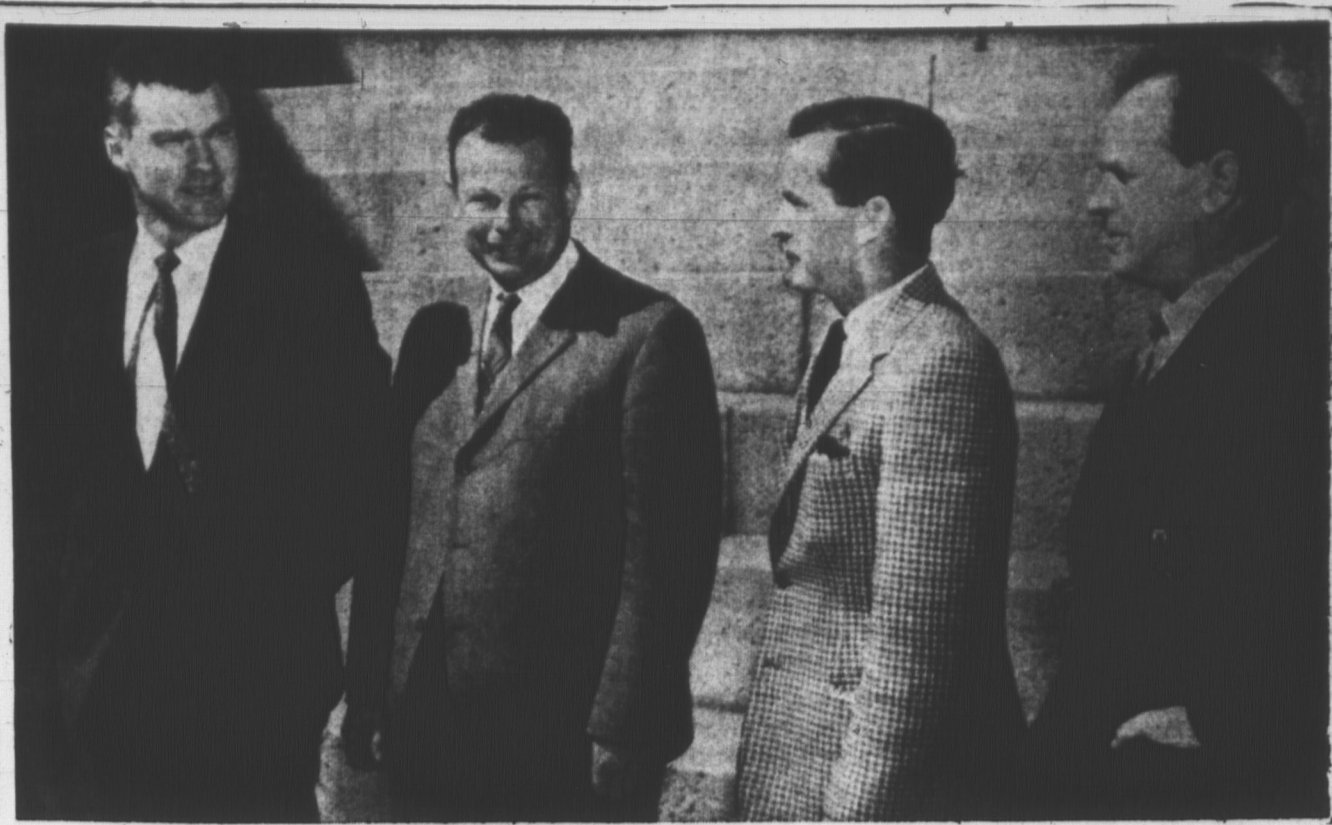
