MAY EXTEND SEASON - Possibility that the cucumber growing season may be extended by several weeks is seen by Mr. John Gordon, manager of Matthews Wells. It will depend on the success obtained in treating for the seed corn maggot. If tests are satisfactory it may prove possible to plant earlier. Up to now it was held necessary to wait until the end of the wet summer season. This year's crop was good with cucumbers grown from the newly developed spot resistant seed showing up very well. Tests using the chemical Aldrin, will be conducted and used to treat the seed and also acts as a soil treatment.

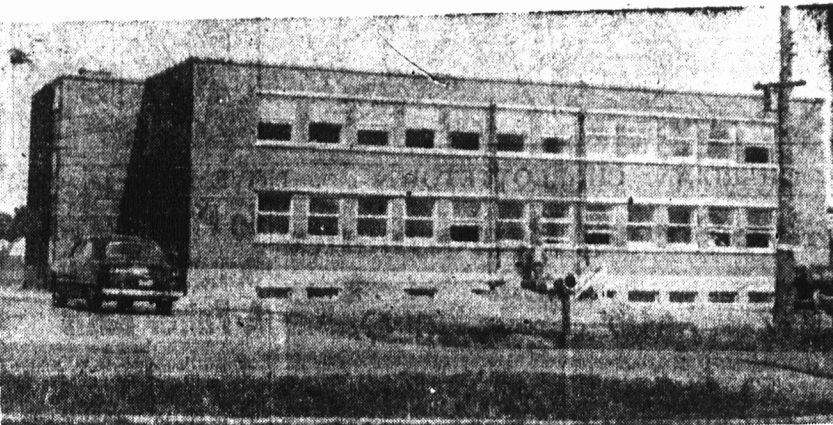

New Science Service Laboratory



Believed to be the finest building of its kind owned by the Federal Department of Agriculture, the new Science Service Laboratory on the Malpeque Road is expected to open for use on December 19. The entire new building is approximately 102 feet long and 55 wide. It replaces the old building burned in January of last year. In the basement of the new structure is a solid fire-proof vault for the storage of records, and a photographic room. Some of the other rooms planned for other uses at present are so equipped that they may be easily converted to laboratories should the need arise. Some of the technical equipment installed includes three large refrigerators in which cultures for the study of diseases may be kept at any desired temperature.

Officials are said to be taking care of practically all orders for cars now, although still faced with the necessity of distributing them as evenly and fairly as possible. However, minor concerns with the potato industry here say there is definitely no shortage now.

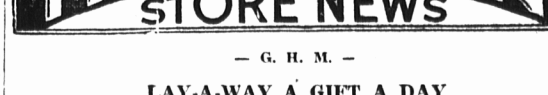
