HAD A CLOSE CALL.—St. Michael's Cathedral, Montreal, had a very narrow escape from destruction a few nights ago. The sexton dropped a lighted oil lamp after the congregation had dispersed, and in a few moments the interior of the building was on fire, which was with difficulty extinguished.

STODEN DEATH.—On Monday night, says a dispatch from Halifax, Captain Amos Haley went out to his barn, and not turning up a few hours later a search was made and his dead body was found on the barn floor. He apparently had died without a struggle. He was 67 years old and was one of the well known shipmasters of Halifax.

EVICTIONS IN NEW YORK.—Rev. Dr. McGlynn declares and the records prove, that in New York city last year there were four times as many evictions as in Ireland. He says that in New York there were actually 20,000 evictions involving a population of 1,000,000. It is probable, judging from the large Irish population in New York, that over one-fourth of the evicted tenants were Irish families. There were, therefore, more Irish evicted in New York than in Ireland, and many of the evicting New York landlords are no doubt liberal subscribers to the fund for fighting landlords in Ireland. How would it do for the evicted tenants to adopt a plan of campaign, and send delegates to the old country to collect funds for its support? Evictions are the same in principle on both continents.

NEW STEAMER COMING.—The annual meeting of the Canada Atlantic Steamship Company, was held at Halifax a few days ago. The year's business showed a good surplus—so good in fact that it was decided to purchase another steamship to be put on in the spring to keep up the service, between Halifax and Boston with the steamer Halifax. The new steamer is a powerful twin screw ship of guaranteed speed of 16 knots an hour. She was built in England for the Peruvian Government, but owing to the war with Chili, she was not allowed to proceed to her destination and has been lying in London ever since. The steamer will be rebuilt internally something after the model of the Halifax at a cost of about \$100,000. Additional stock will at once be placed on the market for this new

Dominion Savings Banks

Limit of Deposits Raised to Three Thousand Dollars.

OTTAWA, Feb. 6. The Dominion Government has decided to raise the limit of money placed in Dominion Savings Banks to one thousand dollars per year. At present depositors are limited to three hundred dollars. The maximum amount at depositors' credit, which was formerly limited to one thousand dollars, has been raised to three thousand dollars. The Government has also authorized the issue of three and a half per cent. stock, redeemable at the end of five years, in sums of one hundred dollars and multiples thereof. This will enable depositors who exceed the limitation to take this stock in any quantity.

FIRE AT LENNOXVILLE

Bishop's College School Burned

LENNOXVILLE, Que, Feb. 6. A disastrous fire broke out at Bishop's College School here to-day, destroying the school. All the pupils managed to save their effects. The college building itself fortunately escaped injury.

Sir Charles Tupper Interviewed.

NEW YORK, Feb. 6. Upon his arrival in New York Sir Charles Tupper was interviewed by representatives of the leading New York newspapers. Replying to their enquiries Sir Charles said that the Dominion has proposed a measure of equitable reciprocity with the United States; that will be made the chief issue of the present campaign, and Sir John will stand or fall by it. Sir Charles Tupper is expected to be in Montreal this morning.

Masters of Coasting Vessels to be Examined.

OTTAWA, Feb. 6. Captain Smith, of the Royal Navy R. S. M., has recommended the Government to order that all masters of coasting vessels shall be required to pass through an examination of general seamanship. He claims that there are now many masters in command of coasting vessels who are unfit for their positions.
