Secret Grand Jury Operates In Germany

BERLIN, Aug. 24 (AP) — A secret grand jury, functioning against Communism in the heart of the Russian zone of Germany, investigates and indicts men for crimes against humanity. The bills of indictment carry no weight now. But the drafters of those bills believe that one day Communism and its police-state methods may be rooted out of Germany. They are saving the indictments for that day.

This "grand jury" calls itself the "Union of Free Jurists of Eastern Germany." Not even the size, let alone the identity, of the membership is known.

The men are judges and lawyers. They say they are fighting simply to retain the old German concept of legal rights for man. That they are anti-Communist is the issue. Some contend they fought the same fight in Hitler's time.

The league developed last year when the Communists set up people's courts. Gavel was being pounded in these proceedings by carpenters, brickmasons, callow youths. Decisions by these people's judges were based on what the party thought.

Soon clandestine conversations developed into an idea. A handful organized the league and set up headquarters in west Berlin, safe from the Red Gestapo.

Into this headquarters flows a daily stream of information on the antics of the Soviet and Communist political denounces another German and causes his trial and imprisonment, his name goes down in the book. A formal "indictment" is put into the files.

Bunny Wadsworth Misses The "Fun" Of Pre-War Rugby TORONTO, Aug. 24 (CP)—Big Bunny Wadsworth says football isn't nearly as much fun as it used to be.

A broker with a Toronto firm who spearheaded the most powerful line in Canadian football for Ottawa Rough Riders before the Second World War, Wadsworth admits that today's linemen probably know more about the fundamentals than the Riders did in his day. U. S. Announces 1951 Wheat Price Support

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24 (AP)—Agriculture Secretary Charles Brannan announced price supports for the 1951 wheat crop at 90 per cent of parity but not less than \$1.90 a bushel—the same as for the 1950 crop.

The 90-per-cent support set by the Secretary was the maximum allowed under the present Agriculture Act. It permits him to set a range of 80 to 90 per cent for basic crops in 1951 except for tobacco which must be supported at 90 per cent.

Actual parity will be calculated July 1, 1951, for wheat. The \$1.99 estimated today is the figure below which the average national price support can not fall on next year's wheat crop. If the parity figure July 1, 1951, is higher, the price support will be adjusted upward.

A 90-per-cent parity support has been mandatory since 1942. The 1951 wheat acreage allotment already has been announced by the agriculture department as 72,800,000 acres. This acreage with average yield, would produce a crop of 1,150,000,000 bushels as compared with an estimated 1950 crop of 996,000,000.

Only farmers staying within acreage allotments are eligible for price supports.
