

# Miners In 4-2 Win Over Shorthanded Islanders In Game At Glace Bay

GLACE BAY, N. S. (CP) — The rampaging Glace Bay Miners continued their blazing pace Saturday with a 4-2 victory over Charlottetown Islanders in a Maritime Major Hockey League game.

The Miners easily held the edge in play as they scored their 10th victory in 11 games. They led 1-0 in the first, 3-1 in the second and split two goals in the finale.

The Islanders led only 10 men because of injuries.

Coach Hub Macey sparked Glace Bay with two goals, and Bob Verrier and Kenny Watson scored the others. Lyle Wiseman and Walt Pawlyshyn were Charlottetown's snipers.

Tempers flared in the first period, when seven of 16 penalties were called. The Islanders' fiery Ronnie Hurst was banished three times for his part in the chippy period.

Ten of the penalties went to Charlottetown.

# Atlantics Score 11-2 Win Over Millionaires

HALIFAX, (CP)—The red-hot Halifax Atlantics skated rings around Sydney Millionaires Saturday night for an 11-2 Maritime Major Hockey League victory.

It marked the first time this season that a team has scored more than 10 goals in one game.

The league-leading Atlantics, held to a 2-2 tie by Sydney Friday, moved eight points ahead of Charlottetown Islanders, who lost 4-2 to Glace Bay.

Centre Billy Watson scored two goals and assisted on others by Hugh Campbell, Carroll Bloom and Jack Hollett to move within seven points of Charlottetown's Buck Whitlock, the league's top marksman.

Other two-goal scorers were Bob Hayes and Bob Bonness, Joe Lepine and Kenny Lauffman had singles.

Johnny Morrow scored both Sydney goals.

Halifax took a 2-1 lead in the first, scored three in the second and six in the third period while outshooting Sydney 54-25.

# Sydney Millionaires Playing Here Tonight

The first signs of doubt from the officials of the Halifax Hockey Club about the ability of the Atlantics to eliminate the Islanders in a play-off series, emerged from the M. M. H. L. meeting at Sydney on Saturday afternoon. The Atlantics' officials themselves didn't utter any such outright statements but the action of the Halifax club in attempting to have the Islanders meet them in the semi-finals indicates, among other things, that the Atlantics are dubious about their chances of taking the measure of Murphy Chamberlain's gang.

The Sydney Millionaires, still smarting from their 11-2 trouncing at the hands of the Halifax Atlantics, will be at the Forum tonight for the second last time this year as they clash with the Islanders in a regular M. M. H. L. game. Centreman "Hub" Beaudry, who has been sidelined since last Monday night with an attack of the flu, will be back in action. The only regular missing from the Islanders line-up will be defenceman Steve Brklacich.

Big Steve, with his injured hand in a cast, has been working out daily at the Forum and will be in top condition when he returns to the line-up. He is expected to be back in time for the opening of the playoffs.

The Islanders will go into tonight's game with a confident feeling of picking up two points. The Millionaires have been sitting ducks for the Islanders this year and not even the most optimistic duck hunter could hope for such results as the Islanders have enjoyed.

However, the last time the Millionaires played here they won their only game on the Island this season. They took a 2-1 verdict from the Islanders but it is extremely doubtful if the Millionaires can hold the Islanders down to one goal again.

They won't if their defenses are no better than they were in Halifax on Saturday night. Of course the Mills were without big Dunc MacIntyre, whom some claim is one-third of the Sydney team. At least Nick Pidsodny should feel that way. At no previous time in his three years in Maritime hockey had 11 goals whizzed past him.

The Islanders may have a new centreman to give Pidsodny further trouble tonight, Erwin Grosse from Shawinigan Falls was supposed to leave Montreal last night by plane and if he did he will be in action tonight.

# Quebec Hockey Ass'n Is Suspended By C.A.H.A.

MONTREAL, (CP)—The challenged Canadian Amateur Hockey Association suspended its recalcitrant Quebec branch Saturday, culminating the steaming hockey dispute over the playing status of 18-year-old Ron Atwell.

The immediate effect was the elimination of the Alexander Cup series and a severe disjuncting of the Memorial Cup and Allan Cup series.

The long-range view is that there are three weeks left for some all-around face-saving while the ruffled groups determinedly go their own ways.

The Canadian Press learned from two widely different sources Sunday night that two possibilities cannot be ruled out: some form of arbitration in the interim, or some move within the C.A.H.A. itself to bring about reunion.

Whatever happens—if it does—must be something that can be graciously accepted by both sides. It was learned also, at least on a personal basis, that several of the opposing groups feel that somehow Quebec will have its entries in the three big series and the Quebec Amateur Hockey Association will be on an accredited basis again when the C.A.H.A. annual meeting comes along in May.

The dispute came to a head Saturday when four top C.A.H.A. officers met in a downtown hotel and then reported to the C.A.H.A. executive meeting in another room, that the telegraphic vote of the C.A.H.A.'s branches upheld the officers' recommendation for suspension.

# S. D. U. Hoop Team Defeats U.N.B. 54-49

The Saint Dunstan's University basketball team defeated the University of New Brunswick 54-49 at Fredericton Saturday night to wind up the N. B. P.E.I. Intercollegiate Hoop League. The Saints clinched the League championship a week ago.

Erwin Grosse, 22 year old centre-ice star of the Shawinigan Falls Cataracts, will join the Islanders as a replacement for Ted Powers, it was announced here early this morning by Islanders coach Murphy Chamberlain.

The sharpshooting Grosse, who scored 24 goals for the last place Cataracts this season, won the Most Valuable Player award on the Shawinigan Club. The award was presented to him yesterday afternoon in the final game of the Q. S. H. L. at Shawinigan Falls.

Grosse scored more than 50 points in 60 games this season. He is the property of the Detroit Red Wings.

The young centreman left Shawinigan Falls yesterday evening by train and took off from Dorval Airport at midnight for Charlottetown. He will arrive here at seven o'clock this morning and will be met at the airport by Chamberlain. He will play tonight.

Grosse hails from Windsor, Ontario where he starred in Junior hockey with the Spitfires. He stands five feet, ten and weighs 160 pounds. Last year he played with Al Miller and Lyle Wiseman at Shawinigan and this year he played with Steve Brklacich.

# Major Hockey League Meeting Held Saturday

SYDNEY, (CP)—A Halifax motion picture team met in the semi-finals of the Maritime Major Hockey League was defeated by Charlottetown at a league meeting Saturday.

Frank MacDonald and Forrest Clow of Charlottetown Islanders suggested that they would lose the benefits of their second-place position by playing the leading Halifax Atlantics.

The league decided to have the first meet the fourth, and the second third-place club. As it now stands, and there is little possibility of a change, it would send Halifax against Sydney Millionaires, and the Islanders against Glace Bay.

# Saint Dunstan's Hoop Star Has Brilliant Record
