## THE LATE JAMES BRAZIL.

James Brazil died at his residence on Ottawa Street, Summerside, at 5 o'clock Wednesday morning, August 1st. He had been ill for a long time. His end was calm and peaceful. The failure of strength was gradual and it was thought he might linger some time longer, but the sudden approach of the Great Messenger came on Tuesday morning, July 31st. There was no doubt his last hours were at hand. He was well prepared for his last Journey. He devoutly received his last sacraments and died fortified by all the rites of Holy Church.

Deceased was born at New Ross, County Wexford, Ireland, November 2, 1818. In his early youth and until age and disease robbed him of his natural vivacity he evinced the fiery spirit of his kinsmen of old when there was question of religion or country; moreover, he possessed a deep rooted sense of justice. He came to America early in life, making his home in St. John's, Nfld., about fifteen years. In May of 1854 he moved to Charlottetown, and in October of the same year married Margaret, eldest daughter of Mr. Michael Murphy, South Shore. She and seven children survive to mourn the loss of a kind husband and father. The eldest daughter left Summerside twenty-four years ago to join the Sisters of the Congregation de Notre Dame, Montreal, the second is Mrs. H. P. Woods of Summerside, and the third, Mrs. J. Kane, of St. John, N. B. His eldest son John is now living in New Glasgow, N. S.; the second, Joseph, is in the American Express Company, Omaha, Nebraska; Thomas B. is manager of a copper mine in Trail, B. C., and Frank, the youngest, is in the Klondyke.

It was never his ambition to amass wealth, but to do good in every way possible to all those who appealed to his sympathy. Many heroic deeds of charity must certainly be noted in the Great Book. He deservedly enjoyed the esteem and respect of all, and those who knew him during all those forty-five years in Summerside can testify that he ever proved himself sincere, honest and unselfish.

He was thoroughly posted in the history of the town and took a lively interest in all the events of the day. He had an inexhaustible fund of legend and story, and his genial manner made him a general favorite. Perhaps the most that could be said of him is summed up in the testimony of one of the influential men of the town who knew him for nearly forty years: "He reminds one of the saints of old." Could a higher tribute of esteem be paid to a fellow-citizen?

The funeral took place Friday morning, August 3, with a very large attendance, to St. Paul's church and cemetery. The Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Rev. D. J. G. MacDonald, and the office of the deacon was sung and the burial service performed by Rev. J. A. MacDonald, Miscouche. The pall-bearers were Messrs. Thomas Frizzle, Patrick Ryan, P. T. Fanning, J. P. McKay, Chas. Murphy and Matthew Dempsey. Mrs. Brazil and the family have sincere sympathy in their bereavement.

Big Day's Racing at Riverside Park, Tignish.

The skin of his leg was badly burned and his foot very much shattered. At latest accounts he is doing well.

Writing a day later the same correspondent says: Greater damage than was at first reported was done by Sunday's thunder storm, from O'Leary to Tignish.

A barn was burned at the former place, and another barn in the vicinity of Bloomfield.

At Tignish the residence of Mr. E. Myrick suffered considerably. While the family and some friends were at dinner during the height of the storm, the capings of the electric fluid plaster through the house, burst the ceiling on the dining room where they were eating. Fortunately nobody was hurt.

The Mr. Cameron reported injured yesterday escaped with a severe superficial burn and from latest accounts is doing well.
