THE excursion to Pictou and Murray Harbor to-day was very largely attended.

CANADIANS are warned against counterfeit \$100 greenbacks which are known to be largely in circulation.

THE Commissioners of Agriculture are now in session, making arrangements for the coming Exhibition.

THIRTY SEVEN tavern, saloon and store licenses were granted by the Licensing Board, on Monday evening.

T. L. FINLAY, Esq., of the Union Bank, returned last evening from Great Britain. He is stopping at Wagstaff's.

SUPREME COURT.—In the Atlas suit of Meacham vs. Robertson, a verdict of \$15 and cost was rendered against the defendant.

THE New Brunswick Railway round house at Caribou, Me., containing two locomotives was burned to the ground on the 18th inst.

MR. KENNETH MCPHEE, of Marble Mountain, C. B., was kicked by a horse recently, and injured so badly that his recovery is doubtful.

WE again direct the attention of the police to the large number of boys who daily swim off the city wharves. Can they not make an effort to stop the practice.

A COMPANY of gentlemen has been formed for the purpose of establishing a first-class bathing place at Sandy Cove, opposite the centre of Halifax.

THE Maine Farmer's crop reports from all parts of that State are encouraging. Though injured somewhat by drouth, the hay crop will be above the average. Grain and potatoes are doing well.

MCDONALD BROS.' furniture factory and Horn's carding mill, on Bras d'Or road, C. B., were burned down shortly before one o'clock on the 18 inst. The loss is \$12,000 to \$15,000. There is little or no insurance.

THE printers of Halifax are fond of boating. In a recent rowing match the Herald crew were the victors. Besides the victors, crews from the Recorder, Mail, Chronicle, N. S. Publishing Company took part in the race.

Captain Gallant, of the schooner Louise, from Charlottetown, sold recently at Sydney, C. B., between \$400 and \$500 worth of potatoes and decamped with the proceeds. No trace of him can be found.—Hr. Chronicle.

I. O. O. F.—The Grand Lodge, I. O. O. F. hold their Annual Session at Summerside, P. E. I., commencing 11th August. Delegates will be appointed to attend from New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island.

REMEMBER the excursion to Alberton Tea Party to-morrow. A special train leaves this city at 6 o'clock a. m., arriving at Alberton at 11.30, leaving again for Charlottetown at 4 o'clock. The fare is only one dollar for return and the excursion will be the cheapest and best one given this season.

THE steamer "Edgar Stuart" arrived from Halifax at three o'clock this morning with freight and Mr. Angus Grant of Hawkesbury, and Edmund Doane of Halifax, as passengers. She sailed again at ten with a cargo of 150 bbls. of pork and a quantity of hams shipped by the Messrs. Wright and Robert Bridges. The "M. A. Starr" will probably arrive on the 29th inst.

A LARCENY.—An old man named George Price made complaint at the Police Court a few days ago to the effect that eighty dollars in Bank notes were stolen from his trunk in the "Railway House," and summoned the proprietor of the house—Mr. John Bolger—in connection with the larceny. In Court this forenoon he could not give any grounds for suspecting Mr. Bolger of the larceny, and the evidence of Price was apparently stronger for his acquittal than conviction. One thing is certain, that Mr. Price lost his money. Who the thief is has yet to be discovered.

MESSRS. Isaac Burpee and Charles W. Weldon, candidates in 1878 for the House of Commons, issued to the electors of the City and County of St. John during the canvass in that year, a circular, to which they affixed their own signatures, in which they pledged their sacred honor to the statement that the flour duty would increase the price of flour to the people of St. John by several dollars per barrel. Will these gentlemen, or either of them, or any of their friends, be kind enough to republish an exact copy of that circular to-day? We pause for a reply.—St. John Sun.

SERIOUSLY INJURED BY POWDER.—A boy named McCarron, son of Mr. John McCarron, of Peaketown, was seriously injured by a powder explosion last evening. He and a number of others were playing with powder in the stable of Mr. Patrick Farmer, and while sitting on a box with a quantity of this explosive at his feet a match was applied. It instantly exploded burning his face, breast and hand in a terrible manner. He suffered great agony, during the evening and last night his life was despaired of, but this morning he showed signs of recovery and is now doing well.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

OTTAWA, July 17.

It is reported that Sir Hugh Allan will proceed to British Columbia to inspect the Pacific Railway in progress there.

A dredger has begun work along the frontage of the Grand Trunk wharves, at Levis, to deepen the water there at low tide for ocean steamers.

Mr. A. P. Bradley has been appointed, by order in Council, acting Secretary of the Department of Railways and Canals.

The Credit Valley Railway has come to an end. The men of the Toronto Branch were paid two months' pay up to 31st May, the balance being secured. The employees resumed work on Monday.

The Custom's receipts at Montreal, for first half of the present month, were \$100,000 more than the corresponding period of last year, an increase of 50 per cent.

The prize list for the Toronto Exhibition, to be held from the 6th to the 18th September next, has just been issued. The premiums offered amount to \$24,000, in addition to which nearly \$2,000 are offered for special features.

Notice is given of the incorporation of the British and North-West Colonization Co., with a capital of \$20,000. The principal incorporators are Dr. Schultz, Messrs. Bannerman, M. P., Boulbee, M. P.; Elliott, M. P.; and J. R. Adamson, of Hamilton.

A museum of military trophies and relics has been established here by Col. Wiley, Director of Military Stores.

Hon. D. A. Smith has published a letter in the Winnipeg "Free Press," declining nomination for Selkirk.

Montreal papers contradict the statements in the "Globe" about the alleged exorbitant charges on cattle from Montreal to Great Britain. They give rates showing that the fares from Montreal are less than from Boston.

A Montreal despatch, referring to Sir Hugh Allan's visit to British Columbia, in connection with the Pacific Railway affairs, says, it hardly seems probable, from the fact that he sailed for England with his family two weeks ago, presumably in the same connection.

TORONTO, July 17.

As there is no chance of reprieve in Bennett's case, preparations for his hanging, which takes place on the 3d Aug., will commence early next week. The prisoner still shows a great indifference, though not so marked since he has commenced to receive the Minister of his church.

NORTH SYDNEY, C. B., July 18.

A serious fire occurred here last night about one mile away from the business portion of the town. The steam furniture factory, owned by Alexander McDonald, was burned; insurance only six hundred dollars. Also, the steam-cloth and grist-mill, owned by Wm. Horn, completely destroyed—said to be no insurance. Total loss over \$10,000.

MONTREAL, July 18.

This morning the communion plate was all stolen from St. Martin's Church. At a meeting of the Irish National Land League here, to-day, arrangements were made for the visit of Michael Davitt, the agitator.

MONTREAL, July 17.

Great interest is being taken in the trial of Oka Indians at Aylmer. A private despatch this afternoon says the jury has disagreed and been discharged. Another trial has been begun, the jury being composed of twelve English Protestants.

LONDON, July 17.

In the House of Commons, Mr. Briggs' motion was carried by a vote of 161 to 147, and the House again went into committee on the Compensation bill. Several motions to report progress were rejected.

Mr. Gladstone pointed out that every day the debate is prolonged prolongs the duration of the session, and now and again a motion to adjourn is proposed, and progress was then reported.

LONDON, July 17.

The Standard says: "We have no reason to believe that when the proposed amendment of the £30 limit in the compensation bill is discussed, the Ministers will propose the substitution of the words 'rateable value' for 'rental.' This would increase the limit to about £42, the increase being the average difference between the two modes of estimating the value of Irish holdings."

LONDON, July 18.

A Constantinople despatch reports that some Christians have been massacred at Adana, in Asia Minor. The Montenegrin question is reported to have been amicably settled. The Porte waits the consent of the powers to the arrangement, on receipt of which the Sultan will sign an irade.

PARIS, July 18.

Gambetta presided to-day over a densely crowded meeting at Belleville. He said the new republican institutions would defy all attacks, no matter from what quarter. This declaration was received with loud cheers.

LONDON, July 16.

A Paris despatch says the returns of imports and exports for the first six months of 1880, as compared with the corresponding months of 1879, show an increase of 171,000,000 francs in the imports and of 58,000,000 francs in the exports.

BERLIN, July 17.

If the Powers unanimously agree to make a naval demonstration in Turkish waters, Germany will send an iron-clad frigate and has instructed the Admiralty to make preparation accordingly.

MELBOURNE, July 16,

via London, July 17. At a Cabinet Council the question of immediate resignation as the result of the defeat of the Government in the recent election was discussed, but the Ministry finally resolved to meet Parliament.
