Annual Meeting of P. E. Island Hospital

Necessity for Greater Public Interest and Support is Emphasized by the Chairman Mr. W. K. Rogers, Who Outlines the Splendid Work Accomplished During the Year.

The annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Hospital was held in the Y.M.C.A. rooms last night. The very small attendance was commented upon by Mr. W. K. Rogers, the chairman, who declared that a meeting of such public importance should draw an attendance that would pack the Market Hall. Occasional criticisms had been offered in regard to the hospital work but these critics did not apparently think it worth while to attend the annual meeting when their suggestions if they had any would be gladly received by the trustees. He was pleased to be able to quote in his report the high commendation of Dr. McEachern of Vancouver, who recently inspected the hospital and found everything in very satisfactory order.

Mrs. Pethick, President of the Ladies' Aid, of the P. E. I. Hospital, gave a very satisfactory account of the activities of this branch of the hospital organization. The total amount raised through luncheons, tag days, cake sales, concerts, etc., including contributions in kind, was over \$6,700, of which over \$4,700 was spent on hospital work and equipment, leaving a balance in the bank of \$2,014.05.

A warm vote of thanks, moved by Mr. W. F. Tidmarsh and seconded by Mr. Frank Hearty, was moved to Mrs. Pethick and the ladies whose valuable assistance has been of very material benefit to the hospital committee.

MY HOLIDAY TOUR

Travelling Fifty Years Ago And Now. Some Comparisons And Comments. The Beautiful Azores And the Up-to-Date Publicity Department of St. Michael's.

On Board S.S. Arabic, May 7, 1922.

It may be interesting to the readers of The Guardian, especially to the younger people, to get an idea of the comforts of travel now compared with what it was years ago, when I made my first trip to purchase goods in England.

In those days, the first part of the journey was made by sleigh from Charlottetown with the mail carrier, to Cape Traverse, leaving the city between the hours of eight and nine o'clock p.m., arriving at Capt. Mutart's in time for breakfast. After enjoying a good meal (the Mutart house was as noted for giving good meals as the Cross by house is at present)—the captain would take a look out to see if the weather was likely to be fine enough to cross; if so happened it was not on this particular day, so I remained at the captain's. I think it was the morning of the second day when the glad words "Now, lads, get ready," were heard from the captain.

The mail and baggage were put on sleighs and in boats, and off we went to the edge of the board. Our next order was: "Take your traps, lads," and off we jumped from board to ice to floating cakes and pans, running and jumping from cake to cake, sometimes getting into slush where poor progress would be made. I admired the courage and bravery of the boatmen; they had big hearts with the kindest disposition to wards passengers, making them as comfortable as possible under the circumstances. I can never forget Captain Howatt—he was always a great help to me. I am more than pleased that he now has a position on the Car Ferry Prince Edward Island. The best is none too good for him.

After our long, hard pull, we reached Cape Tormentine board, and from a distance could hear the welcome voice of Thos. Allen, calling out a favorite expression of his "Calleluah." Here, also, we were met by men belonging to New Brunswick, with their horses and sleighs and driven up to Thom's house. After changing out of wet clothes, and doing justice to dinner, off we went for another fifty-mile drive to Sackville or Aulac, where we took train to Halifax.

Compare this means of travel with that of the present day. A comfortable train from Charlottetown to Borden. A magnificent steamer from Borden to Cape Tormentine. A few steps from the Car Ferry we enter another comfortable car and travel to Sackville—yet was grand!

Greater improvements have even been made in crossing the Atlantic. Take, for instance, the steamer Arabic that we are now on, compared with the small boats of years ago. The S.S. Arabic (formerly the Berlin, one of the German line) tonnage is 16,736, twin screw, length 612 feet, breadth 70 feet, depth 50 feet. On deck A there is the First Class smoking room, writing room, operator's room, and a few staterooms. Deck


