THE INSANITY GERM. — SHIP NEWS.

Dr. Warren Babcock, the eminent specialist, says **Bad Brains** can be fixed.

The New York Journal says: **Bad brains** can be fixed now. Insanity is a contagious disease. The spinal marrow may be drained without death. These are some of the amazing statements made by Dr. Warren L. Babcock, of St. Lawrence State Hospital, a scientist of high standing.

Not only this, but it has been identified as a germ well known in bacteriology, the micrococci pneumoniae croupae, the common germ of meningitis.

In a curious way these germs were taken from the brain of a living man and examined under the microscope. They were recognized and their character seen. To settle the question absolutely, rabbits were inoculated with the germ-laden fluid drawn from man, a hospital patient, close to death's door with this disease, and these animals plainly showed the effects expected.

With this knowledge of the cause of acute delirious mania before it, the medical profession can for the first time fairly fight this awful disease. It is one of the greatest authorities on medicine, says of it: "In reality it may be considered the highest degree of mania of which it forms by its peculiar character a special variety, and is usually the sequence of grave mental and physical disturbances." His hero in these cases even the most learned physicians have had to work in the dark, and against a blank wall. Their treatment had to be of the most general nature, for they had no idea of the true cause of the malady.

It is a different matter now, in the light of this new discovery, when there is a germ alone to be warred against, a germ all of whose characteristics have been studied over and over again by the most expert bacteriologists. In a word, the swat of the evil is now to be reached, and cures are more than possible.
