OTTAWA NOTES

A Bounding Revenue.

AN INCREASED SURPLUS.

OTTAWA, Nov. 12. The revenue for the four months ending 31st Oct. was \$12,654,000; the expenditure \$8,036,000. The surplus shows an increase of \$1,200,000 over the same period of last year. The net debt decreased \$842,000 in October.

NEWFOUNDLAND.

The Question of Confederation

The Union Inevitable.

TORONTO, Nov. 12. Speaking of the rumors to the effect that the Halifax conference will discuss the question of Newfoundland's entry into the Confederation, the Empire says: "It is a report purely speculative, despite official denials, entrance to the Confederation forms the persistent desire of the conference, so much the better. The union is and always has been inevitable, and unanimity of counsel would have prevented many regrettable occurrences since 1890. It is not too late to mend, fortunately, and public sympathy will be with our Ministers at Halifax in their mission of conciliation. Diplomacy is a great institution, and truly marvellous are its achievements after a storm."

The Uganda Question.

LONDON, Nov. 12. It is understood that as a result of a lengthy cabinet council held yesterday, the British Government has decided to retain possession of Uganda. The East Africa Company will withdraw in March, and the British Government will, it is believed, retain part of the Company's organization.

A Priest Punished.

DUBLIN, Nov. 12. The Rev. John Fay, parish priest, Summer Hill, Meath, has been sentenced to one month's imprisonment for using language which the court held was calculated to prejudice witnesses in an approaching trial.

The St. John Election.

ST. JOHN, Nov. 12. George Robertson, the Conservative candidate for the vacant seat in the House of Commons, is not to have a walk-over. John A. Chesley has announced his intention to oppose Robertson.

Steamer Seized.

LONDON, Nov. 12. Advice from Dahomey state that the French steamer boat Brandon has seized the British steamer John Holley, loaded with Winchester rifle for the Dahomeyans.

A Captain Drowned.

PICTOR, Nov. 12. Captain Boudrot, of the schr. Dolphin, was drowned off Cariboo yesterday.

General Telegraphic News.

FRANKLIN CITY, Pa., Nov. 10.—The country almshouse at Sugar Creek was burned this afternoon. The hundred inmates were rescued with difficulty. The building was valued at \$200,000; insurance, \$56,000. The fire is believed to have been incendiary.

VIENNA, Nov. 10.—Victor Rainil, legal adviser to the imperial family, has voluntarily surrendered himself to the police, confessing that for a number of years he has embezzled from the trust funds in his keeping. He says he lost the money in founding an Antrethica coal company. Rainil's high position led many persons to entrust money to him. The amount of the stealings is not known.

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 10.—Hon. Mr. Patterson, Secretary of State, visited the House of Commons this afternoon while the civil service examinations were in progress. Addressing the candidates he expressed pleasure at seeing so many ladies sitting. It was more and more evident that women were perfectly competent for many classes of work which hitherto had been monopolized by the other sex. He cautioned the male candidates not to aspire to the employment in the civil service with the view of spending an easy life.

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—Chairman Carter of the R-publican National Committee sent the following telegram to President Harrison this afternoon: "Returns show we have been defeated by a pronounced majority. Defeat can only be attributed to reaction against the progressive policy of the Republican party."

WINNIPEG, Nov. 10.—It is announced that Governor Royal of the Northwest has been instructed from Ottawa to take action in regard to the dead-lock in the Northwest Assembly immediately after the election in the Winnipeg constituency. Should the majority be returned, Premier Shield will be in a minority of two. Should McNutt be elected the parties will be evenly divided. It is understood if Insinger is victorious the Governor will call the Legislature together at once, but if he is defeated the Governor will immediately bring on the general elections.

Green Goods. The scoundrels who deal in "green goods" are still trying to "push the queer" in this Province. Some of our most respectable men have recently been annoyed and insulted by the receipt of "confidential" communications offering them the counterfeiter's "goods."
