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Federal Aid

Canada. Let us make sure that the same opportunities to use that intelligence also exist. We cannot afford in these days to let any of the hidden talents in our children lie undiscovered. The full revelation of it depends upon the implementation of a program for federal aid to education.

Mr. Coldwell spoke of the lack of a National Health Plan, Old Age Pensions, the concentration of huge factories in Ontario and Quebec and the lack of markets for Canadian products.

"The tragedy of it all is that the world needs what which we cannot afford to give away," Mr. Coldwell said. P. E. Island potatoes and Nova Scotia apples "come under the same category." Eventually everything must be marketed in an orderly manner. If we are going to trade with Great Britain, we must be prepared to buy from them."

Mr. Alex MacLean was chairman of the meeting last night.

Stewart said that it had been the custom during the Charlotteville Centennial year to express an appreciation to many distinguished visitors. TRAFFIC BOTTLENECK

Reporting for Public Property, Coun. Elmer MacDonald said that the breastwork at Victoria Park had been completed by City employees and that a fine job had been done. He also reported that a roadway had been made through the centre of the Park to be used by tourists for camping sites. Coun.
