Simpson as Epistolar. The pastoral staff was carried before His Lordship, who was rested in his scarlet conical robes. The service will commence this evening at 7.30 p. m. The Rev. G. J. Magill, rector of Trinity Church, Newport, Rhode Island, will sing evening prayer. The sermon will be preached by the Lord Bishop of Niagara, after which a solemn Te Deum will be sung. The offertory will be given to the new Cathedral at Halifax.

In reference to the prosecution of the Salvation Army by one of our citizens, we have been furnished with the following particulars: "Several members of deponent's family are lying seriously ill. Several members of the Army were admonished in the matter, yet no cessation of the drum beating was brought about. On Sunday last the procession filed past twice, making a terrific uproar, which caused an aggravation of the illness. No other course was open but the entering of the present action. As if to be revenged, last evening the army passed the same locality, making a greater and more hideous noise than ever, so much so that one of the family referred to was compelled to implore the drummer to desist, which he hesitatingly did for a brief interval." TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Unfounded Reports.

MONCTON, Aug. 15.

Reports have been in circulation in Buctouche and vicinity for some days in regard to fights at sea between English and Yankee vessels to-day. Several inquiries received from Halifax, Montreal and other ports, indicating that some wag had sent the report abroad. The only foundation for the story is that a Frenchman ran to Buctouche from a fishing trip one day last week and told of a great fight at sea between Yankee and English warships. He had the English had attempted the capture of a poacher, when the Yankee warship fired, the Englishman returned the complement, dismasting the Yankee and sinking her. Next day someone at Richibucto sent a dispatch to Sheriff Whelan who was in Buctouche on official business, saying that the Yankee crew had been captured and that the jail was full. Nothing was thought of the fun, but the story appears to have been telegraphed around with sensational details.

FREDERICTON, August 15.

Sir John and Lady McDonald, accompanied by Sir Leonard and Lady Tilley, arrived here by special train from St. Andrews to-day, and proceeded at once to the Government House. Subsequently the Premier went to the City Hall, where an address was presented to him by the Common Council. Sir John responded briefly, thanking them for their reception. The Premier will arrive in St. John on Wednesday.
