STUDYING FOR THE MINISTRY.—It is said that Mr. John E. Miles, who was in Charlottetown last summer with the Miles-Stock Company, is studying for the Baptist ministry.

Don't Miss It.—The concert lecture in the Lyceum tomorrow (Wednesday) evening promises to be a great success. The programme is excellent, including as it does the best available talent. Besides the object of the concert is a most deserving one. The attendance should be limited only by the size of the hall.

WANT A WORLD'S FAIR.—Almost the entire \$5,000,000 that the citizens of St. Louis, Mo., have proposed to raise to clinch the proposition of holding a world's fair there is in sight. Besides the \$2,644,670 announced as subscribed at the mass meeting on Saturday night, pledges for \$1,600,000 have been secured by the different sub-committee. This brings the amount already in sight up to \$4,244,670.

A FATAL ACCIDENT.—An accident occurred at Gardner Mines, Cape Breton, one day last week, by which a man named John Gillis lost his life. He was going down to work in the pit when the cage struck the side of the shaft, tipping a little to one side and throwing him out. He fell to the bottom and was instantly killed. Gillis was 22 years of age and unmarried.

VINEGAR FACTORY.—St. Stephen, N. B., is to have a big vinegar factory. Mr. John Schwartz, of Fredericton, is the promoter of the new concern. He has organized a company with a capital of \$15,000 secured his building and purchased his plant. The plant will be brought from Germany. Mr. Schwartz expects to have his factory in operation by July 1st.

FIRE LOSSES.—The losses by fire during the first four months of this year amounted in round numbers to \$50,000,000 against about \$32,000,000 for the corresponding period of 1898, in the United States. A like rate of destruction, should it be continued during the year, would bring the figures for 1899 to the enormous total of \$150,000,000 or ten times as much as all American battleships together cost to build.

A SUICIDAL FAMILY.—Andrew Briggs, a wealthy farmer, living in New Fairfield, Conn., drowned himself in a pond near his home one day last week in a tragic manner. Briggs first put a dog collar around his neck, to which he attached a heavy rock, and then plunged head foremost into the water. He was fifty years of age and unmarried. Six other members of the family had previously committed suicide, all under sensational circumstances.

UNCLE TOM'S CABIN.—Love is not what it used to be, so sings the poet. At the time of the first fracture he was 10 years old; others took place when he was thirteen, fourteen, fifteen and sixteen respectively. After this last he vowed that he would never work on his fatal day, but guard himself, instead, against all contingencies. Exactly twenty-nine years after the accident that so determined him, he actually forgot, went out to work, and broke his leg. And now, before leaving his house in the morning, he makes sure that it is not by any chance August 26.

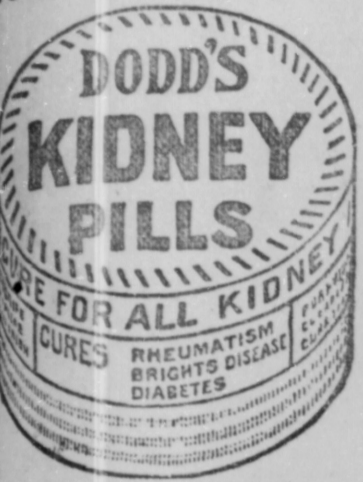
