OUR CIVIC RULERS

Discuss the Estimates for the Year, And Levy and Specify the Rate of Assessment.

They Also Provide for a Report on Sewers.

A SPECIAL MEETING of the City Council was held last evening to receive the by-laws levying and specifying the personal property for the current year, and also a by-law allowing a rate of discount on all assessments within a certain period.

There were present, His Worship Mayor Haviland, and Councillors Crabbe, Hogan, Beer, Hughes, Hooper and Taylor. After His Worship had explained the purpose for which the meeting was called, Councillor Crabbe submitted the estimates of revenue and expenditure for the year.

Councillor Crabbe said that the estimates had been prepared with great care and he hoped they would meet with the approval of the Board.

The amount set down for the maintenance of streets was \$5,000, considerably less than was expended for that purpose last year.

Councillor Beer moved that the sum of \$1,000 for a report on sewers be struck out of the estimates. He said he was sorry to have to do this.

Councillor Beer said he had not seen the estimates until now—not being a member of the Finance Committee. They, no doubt, had been prepared with great care, but there was one item in them that he could not see his way clear to vote for.

what had been said by Councillor Beer. Times were hard just now and it was difficult for mechanics and laboring men to get work.

Councillor Hughes thought that this was not the year to vote \$1000 for a report on sewers.

Councillor Hogan said he did not think the citizens who paid the largest amount in taxes would object to the expenditure of \$1,000 for a report as to the best system of sewerage.

Councillor Beer asked why there was no sum set down under the heading "miscellaneous" as in former years.

There were a number of claims paid under this head last year that we would not have to meet this year.

The work that was now being done and had been done on the streets was little or no good. Accidents were the result, and actions for damages followed.

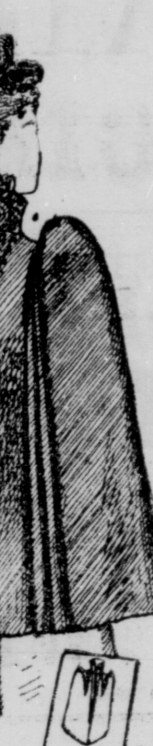
