

Frank MacInnis Tops Golf Qualifiers

Lee Windsor Jr., Halifax, Captures Junior Title In Brilliant Display

A slightly built 24 year-old Charlottetown Provincial Government employee, Frank "Had" MacInnis survived four extra holes of play yesterday to lead a field of 84 in the qualifying round of the Maritime Golf Championship.

MacInnis, and club-mate Donald "Duck" MacDonald, and defending Maritime Champion Maurice "Moose" Dowling of Moncton finished the first 18 holes all tied-up with 74's, two over par for the course.

In the subsequent three hole playoff to decide the medal winner and runner-up MacInnis and Dowling again tied and MacDonald bowed out. A fourth hole decided the issue in favor of MacInnis.

In the first playoff hole MacInnis had a par four, Dowling and MacDonald went one over par. In the second hole MacInnis and Dowling shot par three, and MacDonald fared on the greens to register a five. On the third hole Dowling gained a stroke with a par four while MacInnis missed a putt for a five. MacDonald with a par four was eliminated. Tied-up again Dowling and MacInnis played a fourth hole and the deadly shooting Charlottetonian scored a par four while Dowling went one over. It was a fitting climax to a day-long lesson of stirring golf.

Lee Windsor of the Ashburn Club, Halifax, led a field of nine through 36 holes to win the Maritime Junior Championship and the Nova Scotia Association Trophy. Following a morning round of 81 for the 36 holes, which placed him in the championship division for the amateurs, the youthful golfer earned the best round of the day in the afternoon with a hot 73—one over par for the course. On his outgoing nine he had a one under par 34 and in the incoming nine he had a 39 for two over par.

Runner-up in the Juniors was Doug Lewis of Moncton who had a total of 161 for the 36 holes—seven more than the clever shooting Nova Scotian.

Windsor is a son of Lee "Vince" Windsor a former resident of this city.

The low gross team prize was captured by Charlottetown No. 1 team who totaled 392. Team members were, Frank MacInnis, Art

MacKenzie, Wm. "Pud" Beer and Don MacDonald. The low net team prize went to a foursome from the Bightwood Club, Dartmouth, N. S. They had a 291 total. Team members were, L. Smith, J. Smith, R. Jollymore, R. J. Foley.

Bingo Proceeds Switched To Charitable Fund After Att'y General's Warning

The Attorney General's department announced last night that inasmuch as the Bingo held at the Forum was for a recognized charitable purpose no action would be taken to prosecute those concerned with its promotion.

Early last night an announcement from the Attorney General labelled the bingo of the Islanders Hockey Club illegal and said all participating would be prosecuted. R.C.M. Police on duty at the Forum entrance said those who entered and played did so at their own risk.

As a result there were almost as many people outside the Forum as inside. They did not dare enter and take a chance on what might follow. At that time the Bingo was designed to aid the Islanders Hockey Club raise funds for the coming season and as such the Forum might have been declared a common gaming place under the law. The decision to make the proceeds over to the radio fund at the Sanatorium took the bingo out of the gaming class and placed it in the charitable field.

There was a long hold-up in the start of play and it was nearly three-quarters of an hour after the announced starting time that the first game began. There were several hundred persons in the Forum then and nearly as many more standing around outside the doors afraid to enter.

It is understood that the prizes as originally announced were not played for it is also believed that those engaged in selling tickets had their names taken by the R.C.M.P. before the games started.

Excellent Shooting As Annual P. R. A. Prize Shoot Gets Underway

Excellent displays of marksmanship and high scores predominated in the opening day's shoot of the 79th annual Provincial Rifle Association Prize Meet held over the Squaw Point range yesterday.

Shoot-offs, in three of the four matches held, were necessary to decide the winners and perfect scores were registered on a number of occasions throughout the day. Eight possibilities in all were recorded, while 22 other competitors chalked up 49 out of 50.

In the opening match held yesterday morning, O.C. J. E. MacRae, R.C.N. (R), won the DeBlais Brothers Match in a three-way shoot-off with Comd. Offr. D. McGee, R.C.N., and Tpr. A. MacDonald, P. E.I. Regt., after all three had posted possible scores of 50. The competitors were 10 rounds from the 200 yard range. Ten other marksmen fired one shy of a possible.

Maritime Welter Title At Stake Here Tonight

The Maritime welterweight championship will be at stake here tonight when champion Tommy "Gun" Spencer of New Waterford, N.S., meets Charlotte-town's Harry "Kid" Poulton, challenger and former titlist in a ten round title go at the Forum.

It will be the feature attraction of a five-bout card, the curtain raiser scheduled to get underway at 8:30 between two unnamed local performers.

Other bouts slated for tonight include a six-round semi-final between Louis "Kid" Lafferty and Austin Squarebriggs, City, a special six-round bringing together two local sluggers, Soggy Reid and Johnny Russell and a four-round preliminary presenting Bobby Gallant, City and Bud Ramsay of Summerside.

Although all the supporting bouts are expected to produce plenty of smart action, the Spencer-Poulton go is the big event that everyone has been waiting for. Ever since Poulton lost his welter crown to the New Waterford boxer by a close decision at New Glasgow, N. S., on July 16th, after outpointing Spencer in a bout at Halifax a few weeks previous, the bout has been a "must" on every local fans' agenda.

Both boys are clever fighters with lots of experience and are so evenly matched that unless one or the other throws a knockout punch tonight, it will be an undecided battle to the final round. The meeting has every prospect of being one of the best matches to be witnessed here for a long time in respect to both smooth boxing and fast, rousing action.

Spencer arrived here by plane at noon yesterday and went through a light workout at the Forum yesterday afternoon. Poulton wound up his training at Aubrey Found's gym last evening.

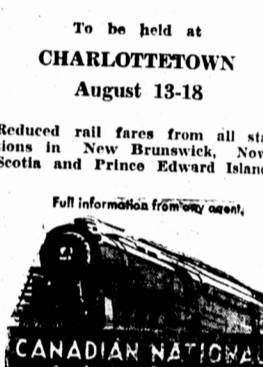
