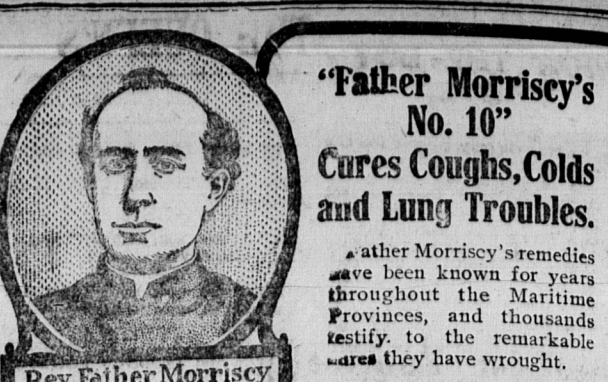
SUBSCRIPTION LIST.
