partment of Sanitary Engineering whose members oversee the work and make sure there is no possible contamination of the water supply.

In answer to a question by Mr. J. W. D. Campbell he said he had heard no complaints about freezing but promised to investigate. He said the work of the sanitary engineers at the schools gave the children an opportunity to study that branch of service at first hand.

Regarding the field of mental health Mr. Matheson said that last year the Federal grant was \$50,000 of which \$35,000 was used and the balance will be returned to Ottawa. Next year he believes there will be \$65,000 available for the use of the Province. It is only lack of facilities which is preventing his department from using the full amount given. In his report on return from British Columbia last year Dr. Alex Murchison, Director of Mental Health, said that in past years the Province was only giving custodial care to mental patients here. However, Mr. Matheson stated that with improved facilities and a larger staff it was hoped to do more from now on.

Some patients, he said, had to go to other Provinces for treatment of mental disorders and this was expensive both to them and the Island as each one took away with him between \$400 and \$500.

Mental Health Clinic
Regarding the new mental health clinic opened this month he stated that it would be a vast improvement on the patient and the psychiatrist would not have to meet in the atmosphere of Falconwood Hospital, but in a pleasant clinic in the uptown area. He expressed the opinion that within a year the people employed on the project would be so busy they would have to have additional help because there are so many

people in the Province who need mental treatment.

In mentioning the staff employed he said that one member was a speech correctionist, Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan dryly suggested she should be used in the Legislature.

The Minister of Health said that there were 292 patients in Falconwood. Of these he said that there were 87 in the hospital listed as mentally deficient and another 194 who with a certain amount of treatment might be cured. Some he said would never be cured but they might be helped enough to aid themselves in the routine of living. Those patients in the younger age groups had a better chance for recovery than those who had been confined for periods up to 25 and 30 years. One patient, he said, had entered the hospital prior to the turn of the century and since then had cost the Province over \$20,000 to maintain.

Accommodation Inadequate
He made a plea for better understanding of the problems of the mentally ill and said it was no disgrace either to the patient or his family. The Women's Building at Falconwood is fairly modern and reasonably suited to the purpose, but it was overcrowded. An even worse condition prevailed in the Men's Building originally built to house 80 patients and now having to accommodate 160. Under these conditions they simply cannot give shock treatment because there is no available space.

Mr. Matheson mentioned his past espousal of a home for mentally retarded children and said he had hoped to get the Maritime Home built in this Province but doubted now that he would succeed. The proposed building of 800 beds would cost about \$800,000 annually to maintain. If the financial understanding reached were on the same basis as for past dealings with the other Provinces it would cost us 6 per cent of that maintenance. However, he expected that it would cost more.
