Georgetown To Be Assembly Area For Pulp Wood

Mr. Douglas MacLaren, Provincial manager for the Bergmann Construction Company was a business visitor to Georgetown on Tuesday. While here Mr. MacLaren met with His Worship Mayor P. L. Boudreault and renewed his company's contract with the town for the use of a large tract of land, situated on the west side of the Town. This area has been previously used as a storage and assembly yard for pit props and the Bergmann Company now plans on assembling a large quantity of pulpwood here, for shipment this coming summer by ocean freighter. This work was commenced yesterday when the first truck load of pulp wood arrived here. It is hoped that the needed dredging and dock repairs to facilitate the loading of such cargoes as pulp wood, at Georgetown, will be undertaken early this year.
