

Pitcher Score Will Resume Workouts July 15

CELVELAND (AP) — Pitcher Herb Score's injured right eye will be recovered sufficiently to permit the 24-year-old southpaw to resume baseball workouts July 15, his doctor said Tuesday.

After examining Score's eye, struck by a line drive in a night game with New York Yankees here May 7, Dr. Charles I. Thomas said:

"Herb's condition is greatly improved and his eye has responded well to the medication prescribed for him. He will continue to be on this medication for another four weeks, during which period he should gradually regain his strength through limited activity."

"He should be able to resume his baseball workouts on July 15," Herb arrived here Monday night from Hagerstown, Md., where he had spent two weeks at the home of an uncle.

He expects to leave on Thursday or Friday for his home in Lake Worth, Fla., and probably will remain there until he rejoins the baseball club in July.

"It was very encouraging," Score said with a smile to reporters who asked about the examination Tuesday. He gave no details himself, however, leaving these for the formal announcement by the Cleveland Indians.

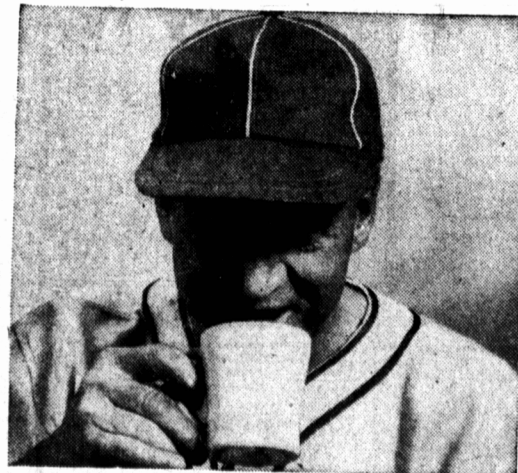
Pitcher, First Baseman Fined
