ON Wednesday night last the store of Mr. J. D. McLeod was entered by burglars. The outside hatch was broken open and an entrance thus effected to the cellar. After robbing about the cellar the burglars went upstairs to the store, broke the cash drawer open, and took therefrom a quantity of old coins. They also captured a quantity of sugar, soap, tobacco and other articles. With these articles they repaired to the cellar en route to the hatchway by means of which they had obtained an entrance. The Currie Scandal.

MARYSVILLE, N. B., June 15. The ministerial delegation were together by themselves all yesterday afternoon discussing the Currie scandal. The proceedings were to be kept quiet until this morning when the conference would reopen and the result of the deliberations would be announced. The reporters, however, were determined to know beforehand the conclusions arrived at and with little trouble it was learned that by a vote of 49 to 11 Mr. Currie had been expelled from the ministry.

Jubilee Banquet.

LONDON, June 17. The Jubilee festivities were begun last evening. The Prince of Wales as Treasurer presided at a banquet given by the Temple Benchers. A host of notables were present. The Prince of Wales, Prince Albert Victor, the Duke of Cambridge and the principal guests then proceeded to the Jubilee Ball at the Reform Club, which was attended by nearly 2,000 persons. A Jubilee banquet and reception was given at the foreign office in the evening.

Church Windows Smashed.

DUBLIN, June 16. Yesterday evening the windows of the Presbyterian Church were smashed and the furniture in the vestry destroyed. The Catholic inhabitants at a meeting to-day, the parish priest presiding, pledged themselves to do their utmost to bring the miscreants to justice.

LONDON, June 16. The Central News makes the following announcement: "The Queen has become alarmed by the reports that the police had discovered that dynamite plots had been arranged to be carried out Jubilee week."

LONDON, June 16. At a meeting of the British Catholic Union, the Marquis of Ripon presiding, resolutions were adopted congratulating the Pope and Queen Victoria on their respective jubilees.
