THE BUDGET SPEECH.

We confess to a great disappointment in regard to the Budget Speech; and we feel sure that this feeling of disappointment will extend to the country at large when it is known that Premier Farquharson—our business Premier—proposes and intends to go on in the same old way that leads to ruin. Twenty-six thousand dollars are to be added to the public debt by the sale of debentures; fourteen thousand dollars are to be added to the taxation of the people through "a certain class of trade;"—what class is aimed at we have not been informed,—and through Premier Farquharson's after the manner of his predecessors, protests that he will make ends meet, there will be certainly be another big deficit at the end of the year.

Surely the Province is now at such a pass that any capable, honest business man in charge of the public business, ought to set about inventing and carrying out a new and better policy. The interest charge against this little Province is, in round numbers, \$20,000 a year,—enough to pay for a new asylum annex every year for all time to come; enough, if judiciously expended, to improve permanently in the course of a few years, all the principal highways in the Province; enough to give us two or three steel bridges every year, forever; enough, as the Hon. Mr. Gordon said, to materially advance and improve our agricultural interests. Next year, if the promises of the Government should be fulfilled, there will be added to the interest charge of \$20,000 a year, an additional liability of \$12,000 a year on account of the new Hill-borough bridge. Thirty-two thousand dollars to be taken, directly or indirectly, out of the pockets of 20,000 farmers, every year,—upwards of \$1.50 each—for all time to come, for interest, alone, on the public debt of the Province. Besides this all the ordinary and extraordinary services of the Provinces are to be provided for. But Premier Farquharson goes smiling on, bestowing compliments upon "the intelligence of the people," while he acts as though the people were fools.

The first half of his long speech last evening was a medley of trifles. He was evidently trying to "kill time." The prospects of the Yukon as a health resort; our own lack of enterprise, a hackneyed subject surely; the forbearance of the Opposition, for which he is devoutly thankful; an unnecessarily heartless reference to the health of Mr. Harvie, keeper of the Charlottetown Jail;—such topics absorbed the honorable gentlemen's attention and his hearers' time, to the exclusion of the weighty and pressing question of the new policy that is needed to make ends meet.

Premier Farquharson has evidently no policy, except one of haggle and humbug. He has been placed in a difficult position, the requirements of which he is unable to fill. The Opposition and the country at large have given him a fair trial. He had, last evening, a grand opportunity to show that he was able to stand the test of ability to grapple with "the situation." But he has been found lamentably wanting. We must, however, admit that he deserves credit for

such ingenuity, or cunning, as to have managed not to have time to say anything about the arbitration of the claims of this Province upon the Federal Government, with which a majority of the people were beguiled at the last election!

SEWERAGE CONTRACTS

Let to City Men at a Cost Within the Estimates

At a meeting of the Commissioners of Sewerage and Water Supply, held this morning, the tenders recently advertised, for the different portions of construction work were considered. Sixteen in all were received. The contracts awarded are as follows:

- Manhole frame, covers, etc., T. A. McLean.
- Eastern and western pumping stations and reservoirs, J. K. M. Donohue and George D. Davison.
- Erecting pumping machinery, T. A. McLellan.
- Construction of eastern section, W. M. Scot and George D. McKinnon.
- Construction of western section, T. A. McLean.

The contracts for all the work to be done and materials furnished for this year's construction have now been awarded and it is pleasing to learn that, so far, the entire cost of the work has not exceeded the Chief Engineer's estimate.

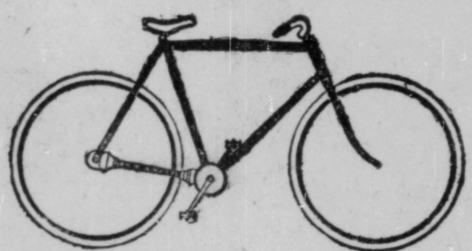
ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

New York Tribune: "British diplomacy is getting on. There was a time when Lord Salisbury was denounced as King Stork. More recently he has been railed at as King Long. Neither reproach was merited. Aggressive as seemed his policy twenty years ago, he has been a jingo. Silent and quiet as he has been of late, he has not been slumbering. It was only the other day that he gave us a striking proof of his effective energy. The air had for weeks been riddled with wild speculations over Fashoda. Some declared the prime minister was slyly letting the British empire in Africa be destroyed. Others were cocksure the world war was just around the corner. Lord Salisbury was silent until the day before he wanted to go to the Riviera. Then, in the quietest and most matter-of-fact way, it was disclosed that he had concluded a treaty with France, settling the whole business in the most amicable manner and on a basis that made each nation feel that it had got the better of the bargain. Similarly there has been a monstrous slobber about the conflicting claims of Russia and Great Britain in China, and many of Lord Salisbury's staunchest friends have grown amazed or indignant at what even they have deemed his neglect to protect British interests. And, now behold! He has concluded with Russia a treaty which confirms Great Britain in the control of what is incomparably the richest and most valuable part of the Celestial empire. Beyond all doubt, then, British diplomacy is getting on. In these two strokes of statecraft the British Empire has profited more than in any and all others for a dozen years; and in addition there has been an incalculable gain to the peace of the world."
