De Gaulle Asks Germany To Seek United Europe

STRASBOURG, France (AP) — President Charles de Gaulle has called on West Germany to join France in building a united Europe allied with the United States, but free of its influence. France, he said Sunday, has made great political and spiritual efforts to establish friendly relations with the Germans after years of enmity. Now it was time for the Germans to respond on a "proportionate scale." He claimed that a West German initiative to join with the United States in manning a fleet of nuclear missile ships under the North Atlantic alliance "would gravely wound the great hope" of French-German cooperation. British Policy Shift Possible

LONDON (Reuters) — Prime Minister Harold Wilson concluded an intensive weekend of defence and foreign policy talks Sunday that might lead to far-reaching changes in Britain's relations with the Western alliance. Wilson called his top ministers and service chiefs to his official country residence, Chequers, for "a long hard look" at basic defence thinking. Wilson may reveal the outline today of any new shift in policy which he takes part in a special parliamentary debate called by prime minister Sir Alec Douglas-Home, leader of the Opposition Conservative party. Death Recalled In Ceremonies

Citizens of the world shared with Americans Sunday the remembrance of the assassination of President John F. Kennedy one year ago. The tragedy was relived in religious services and in public ceremonies. Crowds filled the churches where he had worshipped, stood in small groups in the cold; the spot where he was killed, and bowed their heads where he lay buried. At Kennedy International Airport in New York, 10,000 travellers and workers stood in silent prayer for one minute at noon. Automobiles and aircraft on the ground were stopped. World leaders issued renewed declarations of sorrow — French President Charles de Gaulle, Mexican President Adolfo Lopez Mateos, West Berlin Mayor Willy Brandt, and Spanish Generalissimo Francisco Franco among them. In London, the Roman Catholic Westminster Cathedral was packed for a requiem mass and a sermon by the cathedral chaplain, Rev. West Bromwich. The Soviet government newspaper Izvestia said in its Saturday night edition that "the esteem and love of ordinary Americans" was shown by 7,000,000 visitors to his grave. Marchers In Saigon Broken Up

SAIGON (AP) — Crowds of anti-government demonstrators marched into the streets Sunday in defiance of warnings from Premier Tran Van Huong. On Huong's orders, riot police and paratroopers going tear gas and shooting bayonets broke them up in the toughest show of force here since the days of the Ngo Dinh Diem regime. Riot police swung clubs and kicked with heavy boots as though unleashing a pent-up fury. A score of demonstrators were injured and about 40 were arrested, government sources said. Anti-government Buddhists claimed four persons were killed. Since the downfall of Diem last November, police have been restrained in dealing with demonstrations. But when Huong took over six weeks ago, he warned he would tolerate no street disturbances and said he would use force if necessary to put them down. He stuck by his word and now there is concern that the police action may lead to the same kind of Buddhist protests that led to Diem's downfall.

Britain Plans Memorial To J. F. Kennedy

LONDON (Reuters) — Britain's permanent memorial to the late President Kennedy will be a hillside garden near London resembling "a Zen-Buddhist garden of contemplation" it was announced Saturday. The landscaped, 100-foot-long memorial will consist of a scrubbed stone, a paved walk and two stone "contemplation" seats. Details were announced by the architect G. G. Jelliffe on the eve of the first anniversary of Kennedy's assassination. The memorial is expected to be completed by next June, 70th anniversary of the signing of the Magna Carta. The seven-ton, 100-foot-long memorial will bear a quotation from President Kennedy's inaugural address: "Let every nation know that we shall pay any price, bear any burden, support any friend or oppose any foe to assure the survival and success of liberty."

Returns Home

J. F. Kennedy Praised By Bishop From Canada

WASHINGTON (CP) — President John F. Kennedy placed the death and the will of few people in many lands as few other leaders have been able to do, an Anglican bishop from Canada said Sunday. In a memorial evensong at the Washington Episcopal Cathedral, Rt. Rev. Kenneth E. Evans, the Anglican Bishop of Ontario, said Kennedy was one of those rare individuals who "touched both the mind and the heart of humanity." Evans, accompanied by the choir of his cathedral, St. George's in Kingston, Ont., said a solemn Canadian participation in this still-berated capital's tributes to Kennedy, assassinated one year ago in Dallas. In offering prayers for Kennedy, the bishop said the late president "brought resolution, courage and a sense of purpose, perhaps even of mission, to the
