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# Drop in U.S. Sugar Output Brightens Market Outlook

Pointing out that "it appears that United States potato production will be about eight per cent less than last year," Provincial Marketing Director Reid Sanger said Tuesday "prospects for sale of Island potatoes to the United States appear reasonably bright."

Mr. Sanger returned recently from the annual Canadian Potato Industry Conference in Montreal, which he termed a "very successful" one.

Mr. Sanger said that the United States potato production will be about eight per cent less than last year, but that the drop in U.S. sugar output brightens the market outlook.

was mentioned that 51 per cent of the value of potatoes consumed in the United States last year was processed potatoes. It was noted in some cases that sales of potato flakes and granules were going down, while sales of French fries were increasing.
