NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

GREAT BRITAIN.
LONDON, May 23.
Great confusion exists in Liverpool owing to the inadequate accommodation for cattle arriving from the United States. Three vessels are unable to discharge their cargoes, and three more vessels are due with large assignments. Nine hundred head of cattle were waiting to be slaughtered yesterday. One cause of the embarrassment is the scheduling of American pigs. The new lairages are being rapidly pushed forward, and when complete there will be little fear of a repetition of the present block.

GERMANY.
LONDON, May 23.
A Vienna despatch states that Germany, not Russia, demanded that Switzerland renounce the right of asylum to foreign refugees. Switzerland has refused, and Germany has referred the question to the other Powers who refused to co-operate with Germany.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 23.
Khaireddin Pasha, Grand Vizier, has tendered his resignation, as certain rivalries have been very active lately. Should a change be effected, it is believed it will be a far-reaching one.

LONDON, May 23.
It is reported that Germany and France are co-operating heartily on the Greek question.

RUSSIA.
LONDON, May 23.
Russia is adding a number of swift cruisers to her navy.

FRANCE.
PARIS, May 23.
Pierre Jules Mene, the sculptor, is dead.

The cricket match, as advertised between the Foreigners and Natives of the Phoenix Club, was played on the Queen's Birthday. Stumps were pitched at eleven o'clock. The Foreigners in their first innings made 24 runs and the Natives 46. After an agreeable lunch on the field, the Foreigners again wet to the bat, and made 75 runs, which made their total score 99. The Natives then had to make 54 runs or be beaten. They took the former course, and when game was called, had 5 wickets to spare. The playing all round was very good; but the day being disagreeable there were not as many of their lady friends present as usual. St. Patrick's band was in attendance playing for an hour or two. The largest scores were made by T. L. Finlay for the Foreigners, 23, and J. A. Longworth for the Natives, 29, and not out.
