TUBERCULOSIS.

The Farmer's Advocate refers to a question of great interest to all stock raisers and says:—"There seems to be a general opinion that it is only when the udder is involved that the milk becomes germ-laden. Hon. Mr. Fisher told Parliament that for a year past he and his officers had been searching for cows with definitely affected udders for experimental purposes, but had been unable to find one. The probabilities are, as he stated, that in no country in the world are cattle so free from tubercular disease in any organ as in Canada. But despite all this, we have panicky regulations spasmodically proposed by enthusiasts—well-meaning, perhaps, but ill-informed, or else "worked" by persons who would create a bogus alarm in order to promote their own professional or personal interest, while the public bears the inconvenience and the expense. At the same time the farmer or stockman who studies the well-being of his animals, profitable production, and his own interest generally, will take every needed precaution (by breeding stock healthy in every respect, by the use of wholesome food and pure water, reasonable exercise, thorough cleanliness in his stables, plenty of pure air and light) in order to maintain and improve the position we now hold.

ALL ABOARD.—The yacht Shamrock leaves the Clyde for New York tomorrow. Captain Archie Hogarth is in command. Her crew consists of fifty men.

GOOD TIME.—The time made by the winner in the Bruce-Lynch dory race at Essex, Mass., on the 27th, was 23 minutes, 13 seconds. The distance was 3 miles.

INCREASED PRIZES.—The premiums for the races to be held at the Charlottetown Driving Park have been changed from \$1,000.00 to \$1,050.00, by raising the purse in the Free-for-all from \$250.00 to \$300.00.

THE BIKE.—The professional half mile record was broken at Salt Lake, Utah, on the 27th, by J M Chapman who made the half in 59.3-5 seconds. He also cut the five mile time down to 10.35. Chapman belongs to Atlanta, Georgia.

SUSPENDED.—Captain Farrell, of the Red Cross liner Portia, which was recently lost on Big Fish Shoal, to the westward of Halifax, has been suspended for six months. He is allowed a mate's certificate in consideration of his conduct in saving the lives of those on board.

BASEBALL.—The National League fight for the pennant goes bravely on with Brooklyn well in front, Boston second and St. Louis third. In the Eastern League, Rochester holds first place, with Montreal second and Toronto third. In the New England League, Portland is in first place and Brockton in second.

SHIPPING.—Schooners Kohinor and Life-boat arrived yesterday with coal for Clarkin Bros. The former began discharging this morning.

Schooners Foam, Minnie A., and Katie E. Wall are respectively discharging coal, laths and shingles, for Messrs. Poole & Lewis at their wharf today.

Schooner P. L. G. is discharging a cargo of coal for Mr. A. Down.

POLICE COURT—This morning George Rodd was fined \$5 or 30 days for being drunk and disorderly, and Albert Chipman and John Horne, for being drunk and incapable were fined respectively \$2 or 10 days and \$10 or 60 days. The prosecution preferred by George W. Gardiner against John Finnegan for maliciously injuring his property was adjourned until Thursday to enable the parties to produce further evidence.
