OUR BOARDING HOUSE



It's a small old world after all. That's what people always say when they meet an Islander abroad especially if that Islander happens to be a long distance from the place of his birth. If you were in Edmonton and wanted to see the president of the Edmonton Eskimos Football Club for example you would look up a former Islander by the name of Ken Montgomery.

Ken was born in Bedouque some forty odd years ago and when taken as a child to a land that has since become the heart of Canada's oil country.

This week Ken Montgomery couldn't be found in Edmonton because he's in Charlottetown attending a meeting of Canadian mink men. Yesterday morning he was breakfasting at the Charlottetown Hotel he received a wire from Winnipeg concerning his Eskimos. They had lost to Winnipeg 7-3 on Monday night and Montgomery was notified that one of his star tackles had dislocated his elbow.

The story of the founding of the Edmonton Eskimos Football Club is somewhat similar to the founding of the Islanders Hockey Club. Edmonton decided to get back into professional football in 1949. They organized a club on a community basis, the same as the Islanders did in 1950. Memberships were sold to the merchants for \$100 and to the man on the street for \$10. Since then all memberships have been standardized at \$10.

That first year the Eskimos had an operating cost totalling \$100,000 it was recalled by Montgomery yesterday. They ended the season with a \$10,000 profit. In the past five years the Eskimos operating costs have tripled but the club is making money.

"Injuries are the bugaboo of our club," stated Montgomery. He told us that several of the club's leading players are now on the sidelines as the result of injuries suffered in exhibition games. Larry Kwong of Chinese descent, who had been one of Edmonton's outstanding players for several seasons, is on the injured list. Another player named Paloney, who was All Star quarterback at Maryland last year, is sidelined as is Jackie Park, a University of Mississippi product.

"Last year was the year we should have won the Grey Cup," stated Montgomery. "But Winnipeg sneaked in and beat us out in the play-offs after we had led the League. And who was the best player? The Eskimos had on their roster last year? The question wouldn't need an answer for every football fan recalls it was Billy Vessey. Billy has been inducted into the U.S. Army but is coming up to Canada to play an exhibition game with the Eskimos in the near future.

With Mr. Montgomery on his visit to Charlottetown is his father, Hugh J. Montgomery. Mr. Montgomery Sr. left Bedouque with Ken when the latter was a young child. They settled in the West and the younger Montgomery grew up to be a leading figure in business and in sport. He made a career in the field of finance and in the milk industry. Among his other accomplishments he has become one of the Board of Governors of the CBC.

Abbies Win 5-3 To Take Two Game Lead In Island Series

The Charlottetown Abbies moved two games ahead in their Provincial Intermediate baseball series with Holman's Intermediates by defeating the Summerside nine 5-3 on Memorial Field last night.

The Jack Ready led Abbies lead the best of seven series two games to none. One game, which ended in a seven inning draw at Summerside last week, will be completed this afternoon after which the fourth series game will be played.

The Abbies came from behind in the eighth inning last night to score four runs on six hits. Up to the eighth, Summerside pitcher Paul Schurman had held the local stickers to two scattered hits.

Donnie MacLean won his second game of the series for the Abbies. He gave up ten scattered hits while striking out nine and walking four. MacLean was solved for only two earned runs.

Holman's led 2-1 going into the last of the eighth when the Abbies batters began hitting the tiring Paul Schurman.

Elmer MacNeill, Eddy Lund and Phil Murphy hit sharp singles with Murphy scoring MacNeill. Pinch hitter Gus Flynn was safe on a bunt to load the bases.

MacLean reached base on a fielder's choice and Lund scored when Schurman threw wide of home. The Abbies then gave a demonstration of daffy base running with the result that Holman's picked two men off the basepaths.

Bun Hood continued the rally by drawing a walk and Gus Flynn scored when Ryan blasted a double into left centre. Hood completed the scoring as Jack Ready singled to short.

The visitors went ahead 1-0 in

Paul Schurman, who was hit by Ready's liner in the seventh, made a nice recovery to throw to first for the putout. Buck Whitlock made a good play to throw out Maynard Schurman in the third inning.
