In Lawrence, Mass., they are reducing their civic expenses and have cut down the school salaries: the Principal of the high school from \$2,500 to \$2,000; to establish the salary of the superintendent at \$2,000; first-grade teachers from \$550 to \$500; second-grade, \$500 to \$450; third-grade, \$450 to \$400.
