SPROULE MADE A GOOD FIGHT

For the Bye-Election, King's Co. N.B.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Sept. 28.—The bye-election in King's Co. for the Provincial Legislature yesterday, resulted in the return of Attorney-General Pugsley by about 700 majority over Fred M. Sproule, who went into the field on his own behalf, when the bulk of the Conservative party were inclined to let the county go by default, in view of the early approach of the Dominion contest.

Sproule polled over 1300 votes and carried five parishes. The Liberals confidently counted on a vote of 3 to 1.

Pugsley had a big army of outside help here, who had things their own way at the polls, where Sproule did not have a representative. Sproule is being warmly congratulated on the gallant fight he personally put up against the combined efforts of the two governments.

GREEK CHRONOLOGY

HIS SPECIALTY

Valuable Discovery of Dr. William Scott Ferguson, the New Professor of Grecian and Roman History at the State University.

(San Francisco Examiner)

BERKLEY, Sept. 17.—Dr. William Scott Ferguson, the new professor of Grecian and Roman History at the University of California, has won an international reputation by his brilliant discoveries in Athenian history. Although he is still a young man, Dr. Ferguson enjoys the respect of European and American scholars to a degree equaled by few men on this side of the Atlantic.

Dr. Ferguson's great contribution to Greek history has been the discovery and application of a new method of fixing the archons of the Greek year. Until the publication of his books, "The Athenian Secretaries," and "The Athenian Archons," there was no certainty in Athenian chronology from 399 B. C. to 50 B. C. He has proved that the secretaries of the Prytanes were appointed by tribal rotation. Checking the secretaries and the archons against each other. Dr. Ferguson has been able to fix the chronology of three centuries, in which the exact time of events has hitherto been a much vexed problem, and one which seemed impossible to solve.

An evidence of the great attention which has been attracted by Dr. Ferguson's work is the fact that in a recent number of the "Gottingischen Gelehrten Anzeigen," the most famous review of Germany, mention in which is esteemed an honor, forty-seven pages were devoted to a review by Johann E. Kirchner of "The Athenian Archons of the Third and Second Centuries Before Christ." At the end of his review, Kirchner says:

"From Ferguson's book we have made these extracts, with sincere thanks for his valuable contribution to science. Our knowledge of the Athenian chronology of the last century before Christ has been most essentially advanced by him."

THE COAL MINERS STRIKE.

The Strikers Have Made Important Gains.

SHENANDOAH, Sept. 28.—Yesterday's developments in the strike situation in this region showed important gains on the part of mine workers. Two big collieries in the Ashland district, employing 3,000 men were compelled to close. In the territory between Shamokin and Mickadoot there is one colliery at work and this is said to be short handed. In the Monahoy district all the collieries are tightly closed. Not a ton of coal was mined in Shenandoah yesterday. The Hazleton Associated Press has secured from President Mitchell a statement that he believes the mine operatives have agreed to make striking mine workers an offer of 10 per cent increase of wages.

KING OF BELGIUM.

Will Abdicate the Throne Shortly.
