

Collisions Numerous; Injuries Reported

All sections of the province were slowly being dug out following the severe storm which slammed into the area Good Friday, blocking all highways and bringing road and air transport to a standstill. By late yesterday all major highways had been plowed out, although some sections were reported dangerous on widening cuttings. Work on widening cuttings is expected to get under way this morning, and work on secondary roads will be continued. The weatherman yesterday was offering very little relief from the foul weather that has prevailed since the main brunt of the storm passed early Saturday morning. The forecast for the Island forecasts continued heavy cloud and frequent snowfalls, with no rise in the temperature. The high for today is expected to be in the mid-50's.

Second Firm Boosts Price Of U.S. Steel

NEW YORK (AP)—Lukens' Steel Company, the third largest producer of plate steel in the U.S., announced price increases yesterday. Wheeling Steel Corporation has been standing alone with a \$5 average price increase since last Tuesday. There was no immediate indication whether any other companies would follow suit. After Wheeling's announcement President Kennedy had said that selective price increases would not be objectionable but that across-the-board increases would not be viewed favorably. Lukens said the price increases—\$5 a ton on carbon steel and \$7 a ton on alloy steel plates—would apply to less than half of the company's sales. Wheeling's increases, ranging from \$4.50 to \$10 a ton, were on products that accounted for nearly half its 1962 shipments. Lukens, with headquarters at Coatsville, Pa., is 20th in the industry in ingot production. It said the three-per-cent increase on the two products is effective on shipments made on or after April 15. W. E. Mullanigan, vice-president and general manager, said Lukens has not raised its prices since 1958.

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Raise in PWC's Status Would Create Problem

If legislation is passed to make Prince of Wales College a degree-granting university, the immediate problem for the Charlottetown School Board is that a vision will be made for Grades 11 and 12 city schools. Dr. George Dewar, minister of education, has given notice in the Legislature that an Act will be introduced to the present session to make the college a degree-granting university. A member of the school board pointed out Saturday that Prince of Wales takes about three quarters of the Grade 11 and 12 students from Charlottetown and the surrounding areas. "The large high schools of Birchwood and Queen Charlotteville," he said, "are overcrowded now and they take up to Grade 10 only." "Additional space will be the biggest problem and I think the board will begin its own study in the city as to what we are going to do." The school board member pointed out that the new Victoria was found by two Trois-Rivières, Que., residents in a thickly wooded area at the eastern tip of Montreal Island. Vatican Paper Shows Lapse Made in Prayer

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Observer Romano denies that Pope John made a prelate repeat a Good Friday prayer to a reference to "perfidious" Jews. Italian and foreign correspondents at the service reported he did. In a brief statement in Saturday's edition, the Vatican newspaper says Fernando Cardinal Cento read the prayer without notice on Good Friday. The word "perfidious" Pope John had ordered the adjective striven from the prayer in 1959. Reporters following the service said the Pope caught the cardinal's slip and that the cardinal started again. Most of Italy's papers reported it. One Rome newspaper carried a front page photo of the Pope at the service with the headline, "He had the prayer repeated."

A Vatican correspondent of some of Italy's major newspapers agreed on the incident. Turin's La Stampa said: "Because of an error of memory the canon officiating at the service pronounced the traditional phrase 'For the perfidious Jews.'" A surprised Pope, a frown on his forehead, looked at the canon, Enrico Dante (chief of ceremonial). The canon (Gardino) said he was not certain, realized his mistake and repeated the prayer in the corrected form. In its statement on the incident, L'Osservatore Romano says: "A number of newspapers, in reporting the liturgical service in St. Peter's on Good Friday, have said that the Holy Father had the prayer for the Jews repeated. This is not correct. The course of it made a lapse. The information is not true. Cardinal Cento showed no hesitation and correctly gave the prayer as prescribed in the new change."

Redistribution Promises To Become Ottawa Issue

By JAMES NELSON, OTTAWA (CP)—A problem mentioned in the recent election campaign promises to raise the hatches of politicians both in an Ottawa Parliament soon after the new House of Commons meets. That is redistribution, the redrawing of federal constituency boundaries in line with shifts in population recorded in the 1961 census. Redistribution is undertaken every decade or so, and while opposition parties pressed the Diefenbaker government to proceed with the 1961 figures were compiled, they were barely ready before the Liberals proceeded with the redistribution and the question seemed to be settled in the tangled political games leading to this year's election. No sitting MP, nor a politician of any prominence, is likely to have the boundaries of his constituency changed drastically at any time, and certainly not on the eve of an election. PM HAD EXPERIENCE Mr. Diefenbaker had a bitter experience with redistribution in his former Saskatchewan riding of 389 seats. After the 1951 census, a parliamentary committee on which the then governing Liberals had a majority amalgamated Lake Centre with the constituency of Moose Jaw, with 389 seats. Thatcher, a CCF MP whose bars stung the former government, later led the CCF into the Liberals, and now is Saskatchewan Liberal opposition leader.

Curfew Clamped In Kenya Town

Nairobi, Kenya (Reuters)—Dusk-to-dawn curfew has been clamped down on Nairobi, capital of Kenya's northern frontier district, following a riot Saturday in which a youth was killed and 15 persons injured. The youth, a support of the Kenya African National Union, was killed during a fight between Somali supporters of secession for the Northern Frontier District and Meru and Kikuyu tribesmen. Some 200,000 Somalis live in Kenya's northern frontier district and it is for them that the Somali republic seeks the right to secede before Kenya attains self-government. WORMS SCARCE, WEATHER COLD

The ponds are ice-bound, the streams are clogged with ice cakes and rife, the dirt roads are muddy if not covered with snow drifts and the temperature is not expected to be much above the freezing point today. However, all that is merely incidental to the fact that the trout fishing season opens today. Paved roads which are adjacent to well known fishing spots are expected to be jammed with parked cars and trucks and casting space is expected to be at a minimum at such places as the North River and Vernon River canseways. Anglers in all shapes and sizes, most of them wearing more clothing than they probably have all winter, will be crowding the banks if the snow drifts don't interfere with the fishing. Some will spend a few minutes just long enough to wet their lines while others will come prepared to spend most of the day. If the fish are biting every one will be happy no matter whether he succeeds in landing one or his "limit." But if they aren't biting many and varied reasons will be advanced, such as "It's too cold yet" and "You have to wait until the turn of the tide, because that's when the big sea trout come in."
