

A Resurrection Story.

A Pesth, Austro-Hungary despatch of April 16, says: A most extraordinary case of resuscitation is reported to have taken place at Raab on the 14th inst. Raab is about 67 miles from this city, and was formerly a fortified city. It is built on the river of the same name, and is a place of some commercial importance. A young convict named Takeo, who had murdered two women was hanged; after the body was cut down and examined by physicians, life was pronounced extinct. The body was subjected to electricity galvanic current and after a few hours signs of life were perceptible. The resuscitated convict completely recovered the use of his senses, and his actions were violent toward the prison officials by whom he was surrounded; he soon began to suffer the congestion of the brain and became delirious; during the night he made repeated attacks upon his keepers, and complained of violent pain, asking from time to time for milk and water; death released him finally from his sufferings yesterday morning. The entire medical faculty in this city is considerably exercised over the case.

This is emphatically an age of vast undertakings. During the last quarter of a century, or since the foundation of our own magnificent bridge were laid, enterprise has succeeded enterprise on a scale and with a rapidity at which, if foretold to them, our fathers would have raised their hands in incredulity. The first Atlantic cable was only the inauguration of a movement which should embrace the globe; the Panama railroad, which spanned the isthmus of Darien, was followed by a line which crossed the American hemisphere at its broadest part; the Suez canal showed that nothing was beyond the power of modern engineering skill; and of late, bridges, tunnels, mountain railways, &c., compared with which the seven wonders of antiquity would be mere toys, have made the world so familiar with daring schemes that Jules Verne's passage to the moon might almost seem within the reach of possibility. The arrangements for the Panama canal have only been completed when word reaches us that the Baltic is to be joined to the North Sea by a ship canal from Kiel to the mouth of the Elbe. According to the plans of the engineer, Herr Dahlstrom, the depth will be 20 feet 9 inches; the width, 160 feet at the surface and 64 feet at the bottom. A contrivance has been invented by which this depth can be increased if necessary, to 25 or 26 feet. It is calculated that the cost will be about \$19,000,000, and that the work will be completed in six years.

According to the returns issued the gross produce of the revenue of the United Kingdom for the year ending March 31, 1880, was £81,265,055, which shows a net decrease of £1,850,917 compared with the previous year, when the gross revenue was £83,115,972. For the quarter just ended, the receipts were £27,118,226, against £28,520,188 in the corresponding quarter of last year, thus showing a decrease on the quarter of £1,401,962. The items in which there have been increases in the quarter just completed are stamps £630,000, property and income tax £520,000, Post Office £110,000, telegraphs £85,000, interest on advances £162,845. The decreases are, Customs £990,000, Excise £2,100,000, land and house duty £50,000, Crown lands £20,000, and miscellaneous £198,762.
