WHAT CAUSED IT.

"Under all the misfortunes suffered by the Liberal party from 1878 to 1896, Mr. Cook's example or faithfulness and fortitude was one by which other Liberals might take example."

This is the suggestive comment of a Liberal journal on Mr. Cook's declaration of disidence. Nothing could better indicate the serious effect on the party's strength that the events of the past four years have had. Mr. Cook fought the Liberal fight in many campaigns. No matter how hopeless the outlook seemed he was ready to face it and to give his time, and what some Liberals seem to value more, his money, for the cause. For eighteen years, while the party was in opposition, he stood by it without the suggestion of faltering. Four years' sight of what its leaders did in power turned him into an opponent. The record of betrayal of trust, and jobs, and deals, and broken promises was too much for him. It has been too much for many others. Mr. Cook but says what the Huntington Gleaner, and Eastern Ontario Review and Winnipeg Tribune and Edmonton Bulletin have printed: He repeats only what Mr. Richardson, and Mr. Oliver, Mr. McInnes, and others elected as Liberals have said in and out of Parliament. And what a few thus openly speak many must b

haking. It is not Mr. Cook alone that is lost to the Government when such a declaration is published. He voices the sentiments of many who must think as he does, and who, if they are not driven to voting against the Government, will be abstainers from voting altogether. Mr. Cook's declaration, following many other like expressions from non Conservative sources, indicates that the independent voter has been turned against the present Government, and it is the independent voter that decides the result of elections. —Montreal Gazette.

CONCERNING TITLES.

THE Patriot lies under a misapprehension. It was Sir Louis Davies—when he was plain Mr. Davies, but a few years ago—who derided the statesmen who accepted titles from the Crown, and sneered at "tin-pot titles." Sir Louis was at that time playing the role of a democrat. He is now a changed man. He is a member of a class, and has the right to ride free in palace cars. THE EXAMINER is not and never was opposed to titles for those who deserve them. Indeed we think, and always have thought, such distinctions eminently advisable in the case of persons who have rendered great service to the State. But in the case of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Sir Louis Davies, their own phrase of "tin-pot titles" is eminently proper and applicable.

PUNISH THE DECEPTION.

In 1896 Sir Wilfrid Laurier remarked truthfully that that practical statesman, Mr. Chamberlain, had arrived at the conclusion that the time had come when it was possible to take a new step "which will give the colonies and England a preference for their products over the products of other countries;" and Sir Wilfrid promised, then, that if given office he would adopt measures to that effect. These are his words:

"My hope is—nay, my conviction is—that on the 23rd of June the Liberal party will be at the head of the polls; and then it will be the Liberal party, with its policy of a revenue tariff, that will send commissioners to London to arrange for a basis of preferential trade."

Sir Wilfrid's hope was realized;—but his promise was broken!

It remains for the Canadian people to punish Sir Wilfrid Laurier on account of his deception, by driving him from power and to give to Sir Charles Tupper and his party the opportunity which Sir Wilfrid deliberately threw away.

A SIGN OF THE TIMES.

FROM one of the centres of the West Riding of Prince, the parish of Tignish, it is reported that but two or three persons could be found to pay their way to the much advertised Davies meeting at O'Leary on last Wednesday night. One of those gentlemen was the defeated aspirant for the Liberal nomination. And this too, notwithstanding the fact that an extra car had been sent up to Tignish the previous night to convey the expected crowd. How the mighty have fallen!

—In Wilfrid Laurier said in 1896—just before the election: "The Liberals will send commissioners to London to arrange for a basis of preferential trade." This definite promise was not performed. Instead, Sir Wilfrid went to England and said, in effect, that the people of Canada did not want preferential trade.

WHY HUGH JOHN IS LIKED.

The Berlin News-Record says some good things of Hugh John. For example

"That Hugh John Macdonald is the son of his father his strong lineaments, charm of manner, and magnetism amply testify, and those who heard him at Guelph, declare he is a 'worthy son of a worthy sire.' He possesses, like the Old Chief, the power of winning friends readily, and gaining their confidence, a power so necessary in those who are to be the leaders of men:

Hugh John's frankness, his magnetism, his ability, his honesty of purpose, and consideration for others, are the strong points in his character, and account for his great popularity."

She was highly respected by all who had the pleasure of her acquaintance, always charitable, social and willing to help in any way to promote the welfare of her fellow beings. Her remains were interred in the Presbyterian cemetery, Bloomfield, Lot 5, Monday evening. The pall-bearers were Jas. R. Stewart, P. N. Pate, Robert Ellis, H. W. Turner, and Robert Ellis, jr. We sincerely sympathize with Mr. Barclay and his bereaved family.
