PETIT ROCHER, N. B. (CP)—Roland Roy, 18, was killed in a shaft of the Keymet mine near here Wednesday when he was buried beneath 20 tons of debris apparently loosened by his own weight. Gerald Bernard of Noranda, Que. a companion, escaped unhurt when the tons of gravel alighted into the bottom of the pit. Roy's body was recovered by a mine rescue crew.

MILK PRODUCTION RISES OTTAWA (CP)—Canada's milk production likely will rise to a peak of 16,800,000,000 pounds for 1954, the bureau of statistics estimated Wednesday. This would be an increase of 2.5 per cent over output in 1953.

OTTAWA (CP)—A biennial sample survey shows profit margins were lower in 1953 than in 1951 for six of seven wholesale trades. The bureau of statistics reported Wednesday the ratio of net operating profit to net sales increased for footwear, but declined for hardware, plumbing, automotive parts, drugs, dry goods and piece goods. A survey of 63 hardware wholesalers showed an average net operating profit of 4.8 cents on the sales dollar in 1953, down from 6.73 cents in 1951.
