LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

That Trouble With the Bailiffs.

SIR.—In the WEEKLY EXAMINER of the 10th ultimo appears the following account from the High Sheriff of King's County respecting a seizure of goods and chattels made by him:—

"Capt D. McInnis, High Sheriff of King's County, came to this city Friday with a tale of horror, and to obtain legal advice from the Attorney General. It appears that some time yesterday he made a seizure of certain goods and chattels in the usual way somewhere near the head of St. Peter's Bay and sent his bailiffs to keep watch and ward to protect it. Last night they were assailed by a band of ruffians armed to the teeth with revolvers and other weapons, and the bullets flew thick and fast, the bailiffs narrowly escaping with their lives."

After reading the above paragraph one is naturally led to believe that those so-called ruffians ought to receive the extreme penalty of a rigorous law for assaulting the poor inoffensive bailiffs in the legitimate discharge of their honorable duty. The foot-pad, the burglar, the robber and assassin, are either lodged for life in a felon's cell or mercifully and humanely launched into eternity by the gentle hand of a respectable hangman, and why should not those defenders of their goods and chattels meet a similar fate. So argues the average creditor in defence of the legal statutes which empower him to collect his debts. But hear the debtor's tale of woe and then you will be in possession of evidence on both sides of the question. In conversation with those who suffered seizures of goods and chattels for debt one generally hears the following story: I was induced to buy beyond my means by bland, oily-mouthed agents or salesmen, who, in every instance told me when they took my notes to secure the debt, that though those notes matured at a certain date, and it was only business to give them, I might have as long a time as I desired to pay for the waggon, the organ, the hay-cutter, the self-binder or any other article I might purchase of them. The notes of hand were only a mere matter of form. It was merely customary when sales were made to have notes drawn and signed. It just looked well that was all. As the serpent beguiled Eve to eat the forbidden fruit by sweet words, so these deceptive tales of the good and no harm it would prove to her, so I was deluded into purchasing what I really did not want, and when the time for payment arrived I began to realize that through failure in crops and low prices I was unable to pay the amounts due against me, and of course was sued by my benevolent creditor who had promised through his agent to do almost forever without his pay if I would only purchase his never to be equalled machinery or whatever the article might be. I found now that I had not only to pay the face of my note with exorbitant interest after it became overdue, but legal expenses were also added to appease the bloodhounds that bark in the kennels of justice. When all the items were summed up I discovered to my sorrow that the original amount of the note was less than half the money I was now called upon to pay. Judgment was readily obtained against me in the court and in due course of time the inevitable execution was issued and served upon me by the tender-hearted bailiff who wanted no money out of the business and only appeared in this capacity to uphold the sacred majesty of the law. I now found myself face to face with one of the most serious problems that ever confronted mortal man. On the one hand I saw my weeping wife and helpless children with pinched and hungry faces' looking imploringly at the bailiffs and saying "let us eat the tender-hearted bailiff who has taken our money and left us with nothing but words—spare, oh spare the little stacks of grain and these few bushels of potatoes and turnips that we have labored hard for all the summer and fall in order that we might have something to subsist upon during the cold and pitiless season of winter. But the bailiff was deaf to their cries; not a morsel of grain reached his ears. On the other hand, I saw that all the means of subsistence which stood between me and starvation was about to be placed on the market at a complete sacrifice—the proceeds to be thrown into the insatiable maw of a gang of greedy swindlers, who claim to be carrying on their nefarious traffic according to law.

If, under these conditions, I meditate upon rescuing my property from the grasp of merciless vampires to secure myself and family against extreme want or starvation, must I be called a lawless ruffian and die the death? Oue has only to travel through the country and visit those places where seizures are made to hear the debtor's tale of horror, and then judge for himself what manner of man he must be. Have the debtors of this province, as a class, become so lawless that they are prepared to resist the collection of debts by resorting to violence? On all sides one overhears expressions of sympathy with those men who assailed the bailiffs at St. Peter's Bay. What does this mean? Can any one tell?

TRUTH-SEEKER.

Literature and Politics.

When the public mind of two hemispheres has had time to recover somewhat from the interest which the overturn of one "government" and the setting up of another in Great Britain has awakened from a home rule-point of view, there is likely to be revived an old discussion regarding the pre-eminence of literary men in the politics of the Queen's dominions. Abundant material for such a discussion will be found in the composition of the new cabinet. No fewer than six of its members won reputation with their pens before achieving success in the field of politics.

Mr. Gladstone has been from the beginning almost as much author as statesman. He first attracted notice half a century or more ago by his book "Church and State." He has written many famous volumes since and a list of his magazine articles would fill several columns of an ordinary paper. Sir William Vernon Harcourt was the author of standard work on international law before he became a member of Parliament. The Secretary for Ireland, John Morley, is one of the prominent literateurs of England, was the founder and editor of the Fortnightly Review, has superintended the preparation of the "English Men of Letters" series, and is the leader of a school of philosophical thought. Sir G. Otto Trevelyan was first known to fame as the author of a life of his uncle, Lord Macaulay, and later as biographer of Charles James Fox. Professor James Bryce, Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, has never been what in this country would be called a politician, but his "American Commonwealth" has given him with a reputation long ago well established abroad as a profound scholar and luminous writer. Baron Houghton is a poet and the son of a poet.

British history is full of the political prominence of literary men. Nearly everybody is aware that Gladstone's great rival, the Earl of Beaconsfield, was the author of a long series of novels, of which the first was written when he was a callow youth, and the last after he had become Prime Minister of the British Empire. Nor should it be without mention that the present head of the National party in the House of Commons, Mr. Justin McCarthy, is or has been at various times journalist, novelist and historian. It is not many years since John Stuart Mill, whom many cultivated men believe to have been the profoundest metaphysician of modern times, was a prominent member of Parliament. Macaulay, the most brilliant essayist and historical writer of the century, for years represented the city of Edinburgh in the House of Commons, and was a pillar of strength to the Liberal party.

Not to prolong the list we will mention only two more names, that of Edmund Burke, whose book on "The Sublime and Beautiful" was the delight of all cultivated circles when he, still a very young man, entered Parliament, and whose book, "The French Revolution," was declared by high authority to have saved Europe; and Lord Bacon, of whose speeches in the House of Commons Ben Johnson said that "it was the fear of every man who heard him lest he should make an end," and whose writings stirred the mind of mankind with an impulse felt to this hour.

Railways in the States.

It is stated by Henry Clowes that in many important respects the railroad interests of the United States are in sounder condition than ever before. While transportation and travel is unusually heavy, exceeding last year's extraordinary results and likely to continue in prospect, rates are well maintained and hostility between the great systems has been reduced to a minimum. The result is heavy gross earnings, enabling liberal expenditures for improvements which ought soon to permit of greater economy in operating expenses and consequently better results than heretofore. Another important factor, from the purely railroad point of view, is the wholesome restraint of competition and the restricted building of new lines. The best authorities estimate that not more than 4,000 miles of new road will be constructed in 1892, which will be the smallest total of any year since 1855.
