The ship is in water ballast and carries a crew of 23 officers and men. Longshoremens started work on Thursday morning in loading 33,000 bags of seed potatoes for Havana, Cuba. The ship is being loaded by the Associated Shippers Incorporated, and Buntain, Bell Co., of Charlottetown are the agents. Pilot Temple Gotell, assisted by co-pilot Victor Rafuse took the ship into port.

N. Y. Stocks At High For Week

NEW YORK, Dec. 14 (AP)—The stock market last week rode the crest of business confidence into a high for the year.

There was a brief pause for consolidation at mid-week, and then the market resumed its climb.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks closed at \$113.90 up \$1.50 on the week at a high for the year. It was the third high for the average during the week and put it at a level that hasn't been exceeded since June 5, 1950.

Last week railroads had an unusual share of buying popularity and contributed more than any other major division to the rise. They had plenty of help and many characterized the week's forward movement as a rotating advance with the first one and then another of the major divisions leading the way.

On the week, only two of the 20 most active issues declined. Packard Motor Car topped the list of most active stocks on the New York Stock Exchange up 3-8 at 5 1-2 with 215,300 shares traded. It was followed by New York Central up 1-8 at 22 3-8, Pepsi-Cola up 1-4 at 10 1-2, Willys-Overland up 3-4 at 12, and Allegheny Corp. up 1-2 at 4 1-4.

On the New York Curb Exchange the most active issue last week was Canada Southern Oils up 1-2 at 11 1-4 with 62,800 shares traded. Central Explorers Ltd. up 1-16 at 5 3-16 National Phoenix unchanged

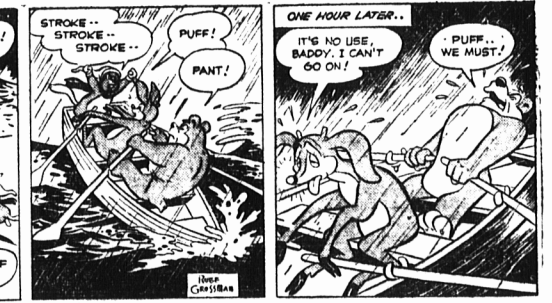
