Describes Services Offered By Protestant Welfare Bureau

Mr. Walter Baker, Director of the newly formed Protestant Welfare Bureau, announced today that the agency is now ready to perform its various services for the community. The Bureau, located at 100 Fitzroy Street in offices formerly occupied by the Bible House, will provide as its basic services counselling with family problems and assistance, with counselling to the unmarried mother and her child.

An important aspect of work with unmarried mothers will be the placement of children for adoption. "The agency will have a great need for Protestant adopting who are willing and interested in devoting part of their time, effort, and love to providing a normal home for another wise homeless child," Mr. Baker said.

The counselling with family problems will include marriage counselling, help for families disrupted by immorality, alcoholism, desertion, unemployment, and child behaviour problems which do not require psychiatric care. The Bureau will also provide relief assistance, budgeting help, and counselling for aged persons with emotional problems.

Today's announcement comes on the heels of Provincial Government approval of the Bureau as a Child Welfare Agency.

The Bureau, which was initiated by a few interested persons in the fall of 1955 and was formally organized, with wide community support, in February of 1956, has had an office and field staff since May 1st.

Mr. Baker indicated that many of the service offered will be available to persons of all income and educational levels in the community.

MONTREAL, May 24 — Two new Canadian National Railways equipment orders were announced today by E.A. Bromley, vice president purchases and stores, bringing the value of orders for locomotives and equipment for the C.N.R. this month to more than \$92,000,000.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government reported today living costs in the United States increased slightly in April. The rise of 2-10ths of one per cent was enough to give about a million workers a one-cent-an-hour wage boost. The wage rise will go to auto and other workers who have union contracts tied to the government's index. The labor department said the April rise in its living costs index was chiefly due to seasonally higher food costs.
