

Ice Stalls Attempt To Ship Food To Isolated Parts

CORNER BROOK (CP)—Close-packed ice stalled an attempt to take food supplies to isolated settlements on the Bay of Islands, about 25 miles northwest of here, Thursday.

The transport department icebreaker N. B. McLean tried to smash her way through the icefield to Lark Harbor but found the barrier impossible to break. The McLean carried 25 tons of food and other supplies for Lark Harbor and adjacent York Harbor. She returned to Corner Brook after the unsuccessful attempt.

Ice conditions on the west coast of Newfoundland are described by shipping men as the worst in six years.

ASKED FOR HELP
 The two villages, with a combined population of 800, last week sent a telegram to their provincial representative in St. John's Labor Minister Charles Ballam, saying food and supplies are dwindling rapidly and help is needed.

Mr. Ballam wired transport department officials in Halifax who ordered the icebreaker to pick up supplies and deliver them to the villages.

The order was issued Tuesday. In a telephone interview, a Lark Harbor resident said the situation is not critical yet, but aid must come soon. He was unable to say how long existing food will last.

The N. B. McLean arrived here Sunday after spending six days a prisoner in the outside the mouth of the bay. She has been waiting for a change in wind direction to allow the freighter Fort Avalon through a field of arctic ice in the St. Lawrence Gulf.

FREED SEALERS
 Commanded by Capt. Wilfred Dufour of Quebec and carrying a 51-man crew, the 6,500-ton icebreaker arrived on the Newfoundland west coast April 1 to free several sealing vessels icebound in the Strait of Belle Isle.

After freeing seven ships with help from icebreaker the D'Iberville, the McLean sailed south and became jammed in the ice outside the bay.

The Philadelphia-bound Fort Avalon, commanded by Capt. Baxter R. Powell, was still in port Thursday.

She is carrying 2,400 tons of newsprint.

The icebreaker is scheduled to rendezvous with another freight-

er, the Margaret Bowater, off the Port au Port Peninsula, southernmost extremity of the icefield, and escort the vessel north to Corner Brook for a newsprint cargo.

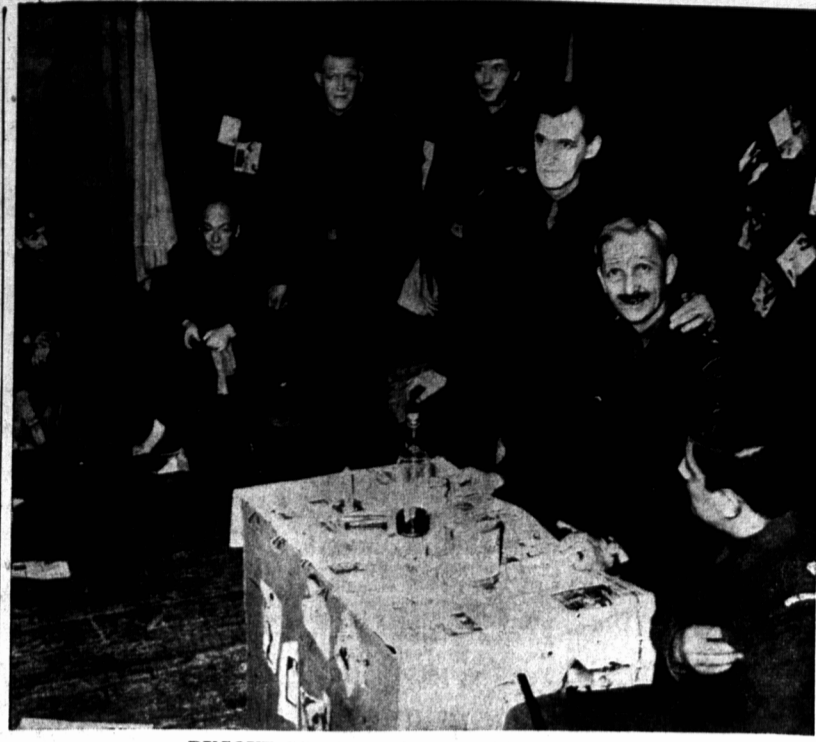
AWAIT CLEARANCE
 The bowater returned to Port aux Basques on the southwest coast to wait clearance last week after a week anchored off the peninsula waiting for the icebreaker.

Capt. Dufour said an easterly wind is needed to drive the ice away from the west coast and permit the McLean to escort the freighters through the ice.

"I could get through, possible stern first," he said "but the ice would close in behind me so quickly it wouldn't be safe for ships to follow. The wind, blowing from the west, keeps a pressure on the ice."

Meanwhile, the lakeboat King-dome enroute here from Montreal with 1,800 tons of general cargo, was reported about 200 miles off South Head at the entrance to the bay, awaiting for conditions to clear.

Only two freighters, the Margaret Bowater and her sister ship, the Sarah Bowater, have made port here since Jan. 16.



DUGOUT SCENE FROM "JOURNEY'S END"

Little Theatre Cast Excell In Immortal "Journey's End"

Last evening at the Queen Charlotte High School Auditorium the members of the Little Theatre Guild and the theatre lovers of the city were regaled by a most convincing and realistic interpretation of the immortal Journey's End, a drama of World War I by R.G. Sherif.

The stage setting, a dug-out of World War I, was most effective, and combined with superb lighting and stage effects in producing an ideal medium for the thirteen male characters to a out with feeling and verve the harrowing details of a six day period of duty in the front line, during which they sustained a murderous German attack and carried out a suicidal trench raid.

The leading role was portrayed by Bert Foster, who as Capt. Stanhope gave a faultless psychological interpretation of the overworked conscientious company commander - a former scholar and rugged star - who resorted to whiskey to sustain his nerves. He was given strong support by his fellow officers: Herb Baxter the quiet-spoken philosophical professor, who loved his pipe and Alice in Wonderland, by Art MacLean who admirably depicted the snivelling and cowardly Hibbert, while the role of Trotter, the food-loving, fat impetuous lieutenant, found in Dick Turpin a most convincing exemplar.

The hero of the drama (if there is one) was most refreshingly done by Frank Zaken the eager, unspoiled young 2nd lieutenant Raleigh, who had idealized Stanhope at school and to whose sister the latter was engaged.

Others in the cast - all veterans of the stage, capably portrayed the parts they assumed, and made a most balanced and pleasing performance. Hal Sampel as the Sgt. Major, Jim Coyle as the colonel, Peter Shama as Mason, Roger Gardham as the German prisoner, Mickey Place as Capt. Hardy,

Charlie Willett as runner.

The play was under the direction of Geo. Anderson, whose sure hand and dramatic acumen produced a presentation whose pitch was sustained from the moment the carefree Hardy handed over his dirty trenches till the eager Raleigh gets a "blighty" to eternally, and the dugout sinks in shambles under the German bombardment.
