**Teachers Federation Executive Meets**

A meeting of the executive of the Prince Edward Island Teachers Federation was held in the Federation office on Saturday morning, December 4th, at 9 o'clock. The newly appointed president, Mr. Elmer Pineau, Summerside, was in the chair. The salary committee headed by Mr. John Hughes, Montague, was held at the same time and a rough outline of their findings was brought in for the approval of the executive before adjournment. The probability of giving scholarships to one or more teachers to enable them to attend a proposed seminar previous to the annual C. T. F. convention was discussed. This is to be given further study. Other questions discussed were: The recent proposed changes in the organization's constitution; health scheme for teachers; teachers aid, and payment of fees to the C.T.F.

**No Trace of Five Missing in Tug Sinking**

SYDNEY (CP)—The five survivors of the ocean going tug Rouille that foundered with the loss of five crewmen Friday night, were reported in good condition in hospital here Sunday. The survivors are recovering from shock and exposure after they drifted four hours in a howling blizzard in an open lifeboat. The men were nearly exhausted when they were miraculously rescued by the Gloucester fishing trawler Emily Brown.

Several ships Saturday scoured the waters around Cape Smokey where the Rouille went down, without finding any other survivors or the bodies of the drowned men. Some hope had been held for the survival of Louis Sharkey, 70, of Fredericton, the chief engineer, who was last seen on deck wearing a lifebelt.

**CAPTAIN RESCUED**

The other victims were William Witherell, 54, North Sydney, N.S.; George Nickerson, 42, Dartmouth, N.S.; Seldon Arnold, 64, Jeddore, and Bernie Burke, 20, Halifax. Rescued were Capt. Herbert Bonin, 45, of Halifax and Porterville, Richmond county, N.S.; Mike Bercanu and Don Isaacs, both of Lawrence Cove, Nfld.; Everett Landry, Halifax, and Peter Muenier of West Arichat. The Rouille, owned by J. P. Porter Ltd. of Montreal and based at Halifax, was proceeding from here to Rimouski, Quebec, to pick up a tow when she ran into the storm Friday.

**Rare December Tornado Hits U. S. Community**

WELLINGTON, Ala. (AP) — A rare December tornado striking behind a stinging hailstorm smashed 18 homes in this rural community Sunday and injured "15 or 20" persons.

B. B. Bolton, air line agent who gave the report, said no one was killed. The injured were taken to hospital.

Besides the twister that lashed the northeast Alabama area, the highway patrol said another tornado hit the Opelika area. No information was available on this storm.

Other storms struck in Georgia. One was reported to have demolished eight houses in the southwest part of the state. Another hit a rural area 20 miles north of Columbus, Ga., about the same time.

This storm-battered section is located about 65 miles east of Birmingham.

Attendants at Anniston Memorial Hospital said the injured brought there suffered fractures and lacerations, but none appeared critically hurt.

**13 HUNTING ACCIDENTS**  
REGINA (CP)—There have been 13 fatal hunting accidents in Saskatchewan this year, compared with two during the 1953-54 season, provincial game commissioner E. L. Painter said Saturday. The 13 deaths were the result of 31 hunting accidents—30 shootings and one drowning.

**Equipment On Way For Montague Curling Plant**

Word has been received by the Montague Curling Club that the necessary equipment for the artificial ice plant is on its way and installation will shortly begin. All preliminary work has been completed, the work having been done by members of the Curling Club offering their services voluntarily so that the work might be done speedily and as cheaply as possible. The members excavated the former ground level to provide proper drainage, refilled it with gravel topped with sand, laid the steel beams, poured a cement wall, built walk ways, erected an engine room with a cement floor at the north end of the building, all in record time with volunteer help directed by Mr. George Gordon. The number who have taken part in this shows the active interest in Curling and it is expected that this will be a banner curling year in Montague.

**Annual Buffalo Roundup In Park To See Slaughter of Some 600 Animals**

FORT SMITH, N.W.T. (CP)—A dozen Cree Indians armed with high-powered service rifles station themselves around a hay-camp corral. Fifty-odd shaggy buffalo weary after being chased for miles across the sub-Arctic plain by a low-sweeping aircraft, are herded into the pen to meet their executioners. This continues the controlled annual slaughter of 600 of the 15,000 buffalo in North America's largest wildlife preserve — Wood Buffalo Park, a 17,300-acre tract straddling the boundary between Alberta and the Northwest Territories.

The killings are necessary. This northern herd, the world's largest, multiplies by roughly eight per cent each year. Man and timber wolves can't fully cope with the herd decrease necessary for its own well-being. The slaughter will provide Yuletide steaks for Montreal meat markets, poison wolf bait for northern trappers and clothing and food for Eskimos in danger of being bypassed by migrating caribou herds.

**AERIAL ROUNDUP**  
The aerial roundup is done by herdsman Pat Carey, who pilots a ski-equipped Beaver aircraft. He must stampede small herds of buffalo to the corral from all parts of the huge park, which is also the summer nesting grounds for the mysterious and near-extinct whooping crane.

Roughly 1,000 buffaloes are herded into the 25-acre corral area 50 miles from Fort Smith, administrative centre for the Northwest Territories.

The killing has been going on for 30 years—about two years after the park was established. This year the cost of the operation is expected to be nearly covered by sale of some of the meat for the first time to a commercial packing-house.

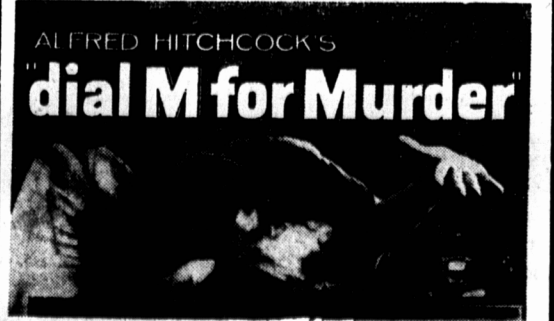

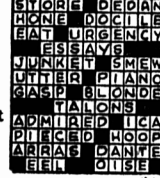

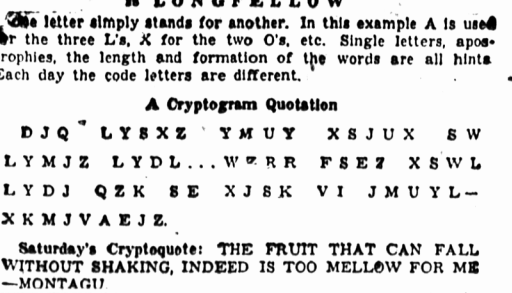
