City Drops Purchase Park, Playground

The decision to abandon the purchase of lots owned by J. L. Curran and Stewart Jones was approved yesterday afternoon in an emergency meeting of City Council.

Originally the lots, respectively two and four, which are located in the north end of the city, were to be purchased and left open for future use either as a park or a playground.

Toward Planner De Sylvia had recommended their purchase toward this end and at the May meeting of council Town planning chairman W.J. Cox was authorized to enter negotiations with the owners.

However, the owners made it plain during talks with Council that they were asking \$1,000 per lot, or a total expenditure to the city for purchase of the area of \$18,000.

It was pointed out in council that there already existed a fairly large open area in the new West Kent School grounds, which comprise about five acres.

Paying the "exorbitant" price, according to Council, was not in the interest of taxpayers.

Council concurred, and a resolution to approve abandoning the purchase was passed unanimously.

Two other matters were raised at the emergency meeting.

Liquor problems were first earnestly discussed by Council. MacNeill, chairman of the police committee, who informed council of a letter he had received from Attorney General Alban Farmer.

Swimmer Missing On Ocean Try

NEW YORK (AP)—A female long distance swimmer who left New York Sunday in an attempt to swim the Atlantic is reported missing off Fire Island.

The swimmer, Britt Sullivan, was last seen by the coast guard near the Fire Island lighted buoy.

The U.S. Coast Guard reported that the 45-foot cutter Point Dume, the 31-foot cutter Casco and a seaplane searched the area through the night.

The seaplane dropped parachute flares.

The coast guard said the procedure in the attempt at crossing the Atlantic was for the escort vessel to precede the swimmer by a quarter-mile and then wait for her to catch up.

The Marine Centre which the coast guard says was "lit up like a Christmas tree" missed Miss Sullivan at one of those rendezvous.

In July, 1962, Miss Sullivan was similarly reported missing two nights in succession off the east end of Long Island to Cape Cod.

U.S. Restraint May Be Slipping

LONDON (AP) — Turkey raised the threat once again Monday it might seek a Cyprus settlement by force of arms.

"We have prepared to send our troops into Cyprus on four different occasions up to now and the latest occasion was to settle the island's ethnic strife June 5," a high Turkish source said.

"Only the intervention of the United States stopped us from going, but the Americans now realize, and we understand they have told the Greek government so, they will not be able to restrain us indefinitely," he added.

The warning was coupled with a statement by Turkish Premier Ismet Inonu to a press conference.
