LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

THE WEATHER.—Fresh southeast to southwest winds, becoming showery at night. Not much change in temperature.

PRINCE OF WALES COLLEGE COMMENCEMENT.—The commencement exercises of the Prince of Wales College will take place in the Opera House on Wednesday, June 2nd, at 8 p. m. An admission fee of 10 cents will be charged to cover expenses. 126 3/4

ST. PATRICK'S HALL.—The concert to be given in St. Patrick's Hall to-night, for the benefit of Miss Lantry's Christian doctrine class, should be well attended. The programme speaks for itself, and the object in aid of which the concert is given is most deserving. Therefore it is hoped that all who can do so will attend. There will be a candy sale during the evening, and those who attend are invited to bring some extra money to spend in that way.

A BIG MONTH.—The amount of business transacted at the police court during the month of May ending today, was the largest for several years. There were 15 convictions for drunkenness; 16 for larceny; 4 for Scott Act; 4 for assault; 6 for nuisance. Eight Scott Act summonses were dismissed. One larceny case and one vagrancy case were also dismissed. A man for receiving stolen goods was sent up for trial in the Supreme Court.

SOUSA'S BAND.—Mr. Arthur Pryor, the great trombone soloist, with Sousa and his band, is a marvellous player. With the greatest seeming ease he surmounts the most astonishing technical difficulties, executing the most rapid and intricate passages as though they were the veriest child's play, which no doubt they are, to him. His tone quality is exquisite, mellow and pure to a degree, and his phrasing and shading are delicious to the musical ear. Mr. Sousa's trombones are all excellent, and in their ensemble playing it is hard to realize that one is not listening to one huge instrument.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon Benny Byers (colored) for assaulting his wife, was sentenced to two months imprisonment with hard labor. For being drunk and disorderly Byers was fined \$5 or 30 days.

Five boys, Angus McRae, Michael Burke, John Thistle, Edward Collins and Herbert McVay, were arraigned on a charge of stealing from the premises of Carvell Bros, on Queen street. The four first-mentioned were each fined \$5 or 30 days and the other lad was fined \$3 or 20 days. McRae is 9 years of age, Burke 14, Thistle 13, Collins 12 and McVay 10. The boys were tried under the Juvenile Offenders' Act.

The Scott Act summons against P. S. Brown was dismissed.
