MONDAY

Rev. S. H. Merriman, recently ordained to the Presbyterian Ministry in the First Presbyterian Church at Schenectady, N. Y. who has been called for summer supply at Zion Presbyterian Church, Charlottetown, preached at both services yesterday in the presence of large congregations. He spoke of Christ, the Love of Christ and the Discipline of Christ. In the evening he dealt with the parable of the lost coin, emphasizing that the value of the coin was never appreciated, until it was lost; that the value lay not in itself but what it represented, and emphasized that a coin to be useful must be circulated. He will continue his studies at New College, Edinburgh, Scotland on leaving Charlottetown next fall.

Well over 500 Boy Scouts, Girl Guides, Cubs and Brownies attended Divine Service yesterday morning in commemoration of the birthday of Guiding. The parade was headed by the "Princess Street" School band and each unit was distinguished through their distinctive color party. The parade, which formed up at the Armouries, marched full strength to St. Dunstan's Basilica, where the Catholic members broke off to attend Mass with Rev. Msgr. P. McMahon preaching the sermon. The other members of the organizations represented continued to parade to St. Paul's Anglican Church where 250 remained for the service under Canon J. T. Hobbet while the remaining 150 proceeded to the Baptist Church to be addressed by Rev. J. D. Davison.

Funeral arrangements were not completed last evening.

Full extent of the damage caused by the storm has not yet been determined as huge waves continued to pound the beaches all day yesterday though the wind had dropped some from 55-miles per hour force of Sunday. Fishermen were unable to put to sea to check their losses, but one man at Tracadie said there would be no mated lobster traps this year and a depth of seven fathoms and the shore.

MacGuigan who received Premier Jones' resignation and approved his nomination of his successor. Justice MacGuigan then swore into office Hon. Mr. Matheson and the new cabinet. As the swearing-in was being done two former Premiers of the Province stood side by side watching. Many times in the past they had fought vigorously on the floor of the Legislature. The clothing, all types of hand-knitted garments for babies and older children, knitted shawls, baby blankets, dresses, pyjamas, pretty nightgowns with dainty embroidery, youngsters' suits and shirts, fine tray cloths with embroidered initials and crocheted edging, and many other articles will be sent to the Queen Mary Maternity Hospital in England and to the P.E.I. Displayed with the clothing were a number of lovely Christmas cards received from Her late Majesty Queen Mary over the years from 1934 to the present, and a certificate from the Queen Mary presented to the Guild in recognition of their magnificent work during the war years.

Mr. Thomas J. Kiekham, M.P., Souris, was nominated to contest King's County for the Liberal Party in the next Federal election at a party convention held yesterday at Georgetown. It was one of the largest conventions ever held in Georgetown. The nominee won his Federal Parliament seat in the general election of 1949 when he defeated Major John A. Macdonald, Cardigan. His name, the only one to come before the convention, was proposed by Mr. B. H. Yeo, Montague, and seconded by Mr. Andrew Peters, Rollo Bay.

Among the main speakers was Premier A. W. Matheson who referred to the present lobster fishing situation and mentioned the great losses sustained in the recent storm. The Premier said that after investigation if the losses prove as severe as estimated the Provincial Government would do everything possible to assist needy fishermen. He also held out the hope that the Federal Department of Fisheries might see its way clear to offer further aid.

All information he is presently assembling regarding recent storm damage to fishing equipment is being forwarded to Ottawa, Mr. J. Watson, MacNaught M.E. Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister of Fisheries, said last night.

Personally visiting the badly hit areas he is estimated to run between 55 and 60 per cent. In the eastern part of the island he found even more damage with estimates at North Lake where 60 boats are based running to \$60,000 in losses and another \$32,000 at Naurage. Mr. MacNaught said the equipment of some fishermen had been so badly damaged that they were unable to resume fishing this year. He expressed great regret that the

insurance scheme was not in operation. Suggestions have been advanced in several quarters that a fall fishing season be established in areas where the damage was most extensive as fishermen in those sections cannot resume during the present season.

FRIDAY The great excitement for planning communities for the future and rectifying mistakes of the past was emphasized last night at the annual dinner meeting of the P. E. Division of the Community Planning Association of Canada held at the Y. M. C. A.

Principal speaker was Dr. Ira P. MacNabb, well known engineer of Halifax and a past-president of the Engineering Institute of Canada. He told the gathering that in the past provision for adequate services in water, streets, sewerage and sanitation had been the responsibility of the municipality which had tended to keep those services within its own boundaries.

Mr. J. O. C. Campbell, Deputy Attorney General, has resigned as chairman of the Provincial Marketing Board, due to ill health. Mr. Campbell has been ill for some time and is at present in the Prince County Hospital, Summerside.

Named as new chairman of the Board is Mr. Walter E. Shaw, O.B.E., Deputy Minister of Agriculture, who was appointed at a meeting of the Executive Council yesterday.

Indian River players once again carried off the C.W.L. Trophy for three act play competition in the Provincial Drama Festival with their presentation last evening of the comedy drama "The Family Doctor".

Mr. Donald Wetmore, adjudicator of the festival, described the production as highly entertaining, and he praised the spirit and the excellent tempo of the presentation. He commended their choice of play as a suitable play with lots of appeal which the group was well able to handle.
