

Poulton-Percy Ready For Elimination Bout Tonight

The Charlottetown Forum tonight will be the boxing mecca of Eastern Canada as many of the leading boxers from the Maritimes and Quebec, along with their managers and trainers, climb into the ring for fights that could lead to title shots for the more brilliant performers.

Two of Eastern Canada's outstanding middle-weight, Harry "Kid" Poulton of Charlottetown and Tony Percy, "The Sherbrooke Express" from Sherbrooke, Quebec meet in the main bout, a ten-round go that is billed as an elimination bout in the hunt for the Dominion Middleweight crown.

Both fighters went through their final workouts at the Forum last night before an enthusiastic crowd of about seven o'clock and Percy appeared in perfect condition after hard training grinds and impressed ringfighters with their workmanship.

Minutes before Poulton entered the ring boxing promoter Ivan Doherty received a wire from Harry Trainer of New Glasgow in which Garry Simon challenged the winner of the main bout.

Simon holds a decision over both fighters. His challenge was the second to the winner of the fight last week, Cobey McCluskey submitted a challenge.

Interest in the fight has spread far wider than the Maritimes. Among those who booked into the City yesterday was Nat Forman,

the boxing promoter, manager and trainer of New York. Forman will manage Gerry Fraser tonight. He also has submitted a challenge for Erwin Schultz to the winner of the main bout.

Gerry Fraser of Halifax and Don "Duck" Trainer of Charlottetown meet in a six round semi-final. This is a grudge fight and one that both boys have looked forward to for some time.

Trainer decided Fraser in a four rounder two years ago. Since then the boys have gone different ways but Fraser has long looked for a chance to reverse his previous loss. Both fighters recently disposed of Bob Medley via the knockout route and appeared evenly matched.

In another six-rounder Gaston Roy, the tireless puncher from Quebec meets Bud Ramsay of Summerside. Roy has a three round knockout over Ramsay in his credit but the summerist has vowed that he will even matters in the return bout this evening.

And in still another six-rounder Buddy Lund, the crowd pleasing fighter from Charlottetown meets Harold Schultz of Halifax.

Joey Longaphie and Bubbles Quinn of the City meet in the four-round curtain raiser.

The referee for the main bout will be George Stewart of Summerside and the judges George Hooper and Tom White of Charlottetown.

Jackie Robinson Takes Over NL Batting Lead

NEW YORK (AP)—Brooklyn's Jackie Robinson virtually has come out of nowhere to take over the National League batting lead in a tight four-way competition also involving Stan Musial and Ray Jablonski of the St. Louis Cardinals and Don Mueller of New York Giants.

This is the way the race stood Monday: Robinson, .388; Musial, .385; Jablonski, .384 and Mueller, .380.

Robinson, the senior circuit's batting champion in 1949 moved up from seventh place last week, tracking out 12 hits in 23 times at bat, a .522 pace.

Musial and Jablonski each gained 10 points. Stan collected nine hits in 19 at bats and Jablonski went 10-for-21. Mueller showed even a greater increase—16 points in 12 hits in 18 trips.

In the American League, Bobby Avila of Cleveland held on to first place over Al Rosen although he faded off six points to .381. Rosen dropped 16 points to .346 on a 1-for-18, before he was sidelined last Saturday with a broken right index finger.

Musial and Chicago's Hank Sauer are tied for the National League lead in home runs with 18 apiece. Stan is the undisputed pacesetter in runs batted in with 61.

Rosen continues to lead the American League in home runs, 13, although he relinquished the top spot in RBIs to Chicago's Minnie Miñoso. Al has 49 to Miñoso's 51.

 Boston Red Sox moved into fifth place in the American League Monday with a double at-home victory over Detroit Tigers. Bill Bolling's 12th-inning single scored Harry Agganis for the Sox who won the opener 3-2.

Tom Brewer evened his season's record at 2-2 in winning the second game. He had a 4-2 edge going into the ninth when two former Red Sox players, Johnny Pesky and Fred Hatfield, sent the game into overtime.

Pesky opened with a pinch walk and Hatfield, batting for Ned Garver, slammed a homer down the right field foul line.

Dick Marlowe relieved Garver and was the loser. He gave up a leadoff single to Agganis in the 12th. Sammy White sacrificed and Ted Lepcio drew an intentional walk to set the stage for Bolling's winning single.

Frank Sullivan pitched Boston to victory in the opener.

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Carl Furillo's 12th-inning single after two men had walked and Roy Campanella's theft of home stretched the Brooklyn Dodgers' winning streak to 10 straight with a 7-5 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals after the Birds went the game into overtime with a three-run ninth-inning rally.

Furillo came through with a single for the winning run and then Campanella, with pitcher Clem Labine batting, caught the Cardinals napping and stole home for an added run.

The Cardinals belted starter Preacher Roe out of the box in the ninth with their three-run rally but reliever Jim Hughes came on with the bases loaded and none out to put out the fire.

Brooklyn had scored two runs in the seventh on singles by Junior

Gilliam and Pee Wee Reese and a two-run double by Duke Snider. Campanella blasted his sixth homer of the year in the eighth. Snider also connected for a homer off starter Gerry Staley in the fifth.

The Cardinals scored in the third on a home run by Moon, as he got the first hit off Roe. Stan Musial smashed his 19th home run of the year in the fourth to take over the National League lead.

Rainy Weather Delays Spraying

QUEBEC, (CP)—Cold, rainy weather Monday continued to hold up eight spray planes at Matapeque, Que., and six more at Hornes Gulch, N.B., waiting to begin spraying budworm-infested forests near the New Brunswick border.

Sponsored jointly by the Quebec government and three paper companies in New Brunswick, the operation will see about 300 square miles of timber sprayed with 160,000 gallons of DDT solution.

The whole operation must be completed by the end of June when the caterpillar changes into a pupa and crawls into a protective cocoon.

He was discovered two days out of Suva and spent the rest of the voyage in the crew's quarters.

Ship's officers said he might be taken back to New Zealand on the return voyage tomorrow.

British Runner Almost Equals Two-Mile Record

LONDON (AP)—Chris Chataway traded pace making roles with Roger Bannister Monday and came within six tenths of a second of equalling the world two-mile record.

With Bannister, first man to break the four minute barrier for the mile, leading the way to the halfway mark, Chataway was timed in eight minutes 41 seconds for two miles at the British track and field meet. The world record is 8:40.4, set by Belgium's Gaston Reiff in 1952.

Chataway's time was a British record, breaking the mark of 8:47.4, set by Gordon Pirie.

Chataway was one of two pacemakers for Bannister when he ran his amazing 3:59.4 mile at Oxford May 6.

Czechoslovakia's Stanislav Jungwirth, who beat Bannister in a half mile race last Saturday, finished second, 120 yards behind Chataway, with Frans Herman of Belgium third.

The race was run on a track that was soft on top after a heavy overnight rain. Nevertheless the crowd of 40,000 jamming White City stadium saw a number of fast performances, including two by American runners.

Lou Jones, 22-year-old New Yorker, beat out Derek Johnson of Oxford in an exciting finish of the 400-yard invitation event in 48.4 seconds. Olympic champion Lindy Remigio of Hartford, Conn., took the 100 metres international invitation in 10.6 seconds. He passed the 100 yards in 9.8.

The first three men in a special mile race for British runners all were timed in less than 4:10. Peter Driver came in first in 4:08. Six Britons have bettered a 4:10 mile during this week-end, and 17 altogether.

Blames Petrillo For Musicians Dispute

MONTREAL, (CP)—George E. Price, first vice-president of the American Guild of Variety Artists, Monday blamed James C. Petrillo, president of the American Federation of Musicians, for a dispute in Canada between the AGVA and AFM.

The AGVA met here in hope of settling the differences threatening to leave Montreal night clubs without acts and to hold up plans to produce entertainment at the Canadian National Exhibition in Toronto this fall. Both are American Federation of Labor unions.

Mr. Price said the dispute is "strictly Petrillo's doing to show his power."

AGVA officials said the Montreal musicians local sent a letter to Montreal night club owners saying members of the union would not perform after June 21 on the same program as AGVA entertainers.

Officials said a delegation representing Montreal night clubs and entertainment agencies plan to meet Labor Minister Barrette of Quebec today in connection with the dispute.

3 Plead Guilty To Armed Robbery

ST. JEROME, Que. (CP)—Three men pleaded guilty Monday to a total of 20 charges of armed robbery before Judge Eugene Lafontaine. Sentence was set for Friday morning.

Roy Blesdale, 27, was charged with 10 armed robberies and one count of auto theft. Armand Paquin, 39, was charged with eight armed robberies and Clifford French was accused of two hold-ups. All three are from Montreal.

The men were arrested last week after holdups at St. Philippe d'Armentville and St. Augustine, west of Montreal.
