The St. Dunstan's annual Winter Carnival was unofficially opened with the traditional Torchlight parade from Confederation Center Square to the SDU campus last night. Approximately 350 marchers participated in this ceremony which started at 8.30.

Meanwhile a large, exuberant crowd of university and high school students gathered at the Main Building on the university's campus to await the arrival of the marchers and to view the official opening of their carnival by Rt. Rev. George MacDonald. A moment after the "cutting of the ribbon" the gymnasium was "stormed" by a mass of students all anxiously waiting to see their Varsity basketball team in action against St. Francis Xavier. A dance in the gym followed the ball game.

In a report by a member of the carnival executive, it was stated over 80 per cent of the student body had purchased carnival passes and tickets for the feature performance by the Clancy Brothers and Tommy Makem.

The carnival continues for three more days with activities for all the students to participate in. Class competitions are numerous and on Saturday evening at the Basilica Recreation Centre the coronation of the Carnival Queen will take place. Other main event activities include a Varsity basketball game against Acadia University Friday afternoon and the Varsity hockey team will play hosts to Acadia Saturday afternoon at two o'clock.

The carnival will be brought to a close Sunday evening with the presentation of class awards.

Heavy Snow Is Forecast For Province

The Charlottetown Radio range recorded 3 inches of snowfall last evening. The recording was made at 8 o'clock, about an hour after snow started falling.

It was still snowing at midnight with the wind east at 25 gusting to 32 miles per hour. This was an increase over the recording of easterly winds 20 gusting to 30 made at 8 o'clock last night.

The temperature was recorded at 30 degrees with a low of 26 recorded at six o'clock yesterday morning.

The barometer was 29.28 and falling rapidly.

Reports from the weather station in Summerside revealed that the storm was expected to hit that area about midnight bringing four to eight inches of snow for all of Prince Edward Island. Winds were forecast to be northeast at 30 gusting to 50 m.p.h.

It was snowing in the eastern section of the province before 10 o'clock last evening and travelling conditions were quite slippery due to the light snowfall.

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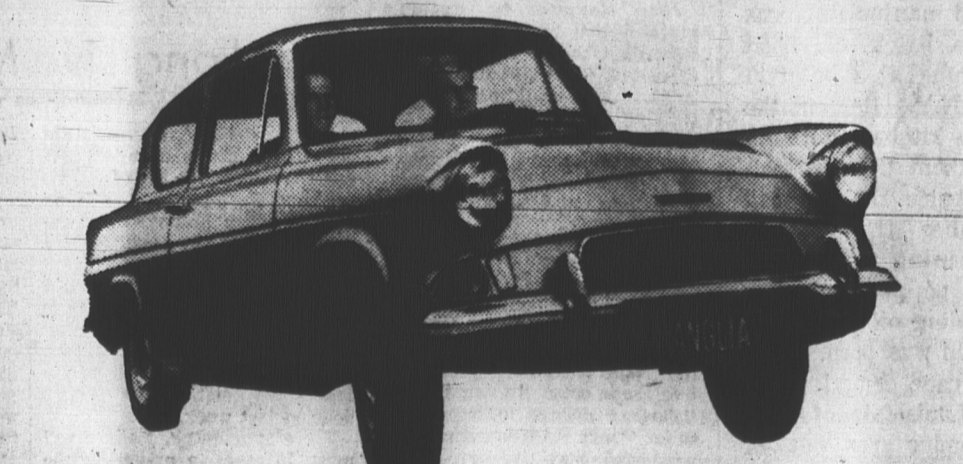
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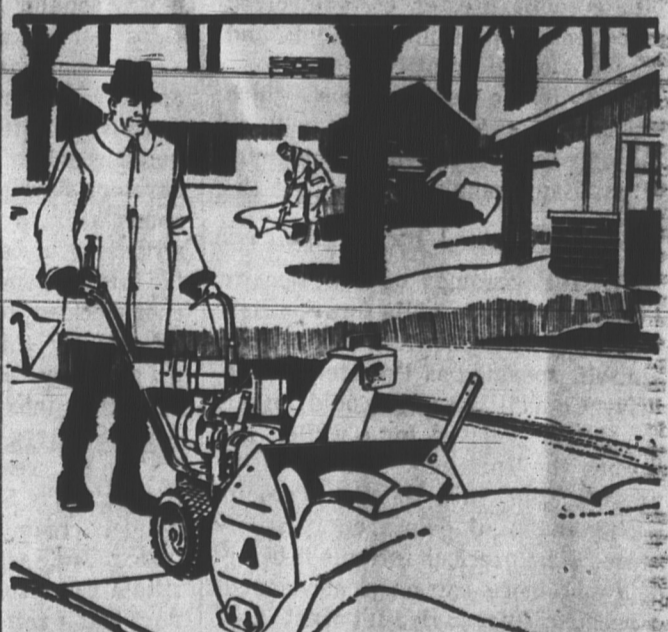
