U.S. Bill Aimed At Better Control Of 'Pep Pills'

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate sent to the House of Representatives Saturday a bill to give the United States government broad new powers to combat the illegal use of "pep pills" and "good pills."

By unanimous vote it passed down to the House by Senator Thomas J. Dodd (Conn.) to regulate distribution and manufacture of barbiturates and amphetamines.

In committee hearings on the proposed new legislation, witnesses testified illegal use of these pills could be blamed for a share of the rise in crime, juvenile delinquency and traffic deaths.

The federal drug commissioner, George Larrick, has said enormous profits were being made by organized rings dealing in the illegal sale of these drugs.

New York Stocks Recovering From Asian Crisis Jitters

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market last week posted its first weekly advance in four weeks as fear quieted about involvement in a Southeast Asia military confrontation.

But the volume of 19,324,510 shares was the lightest for any five-day trading week since the week ending Aug. 10, 1963, when 18,042,010 shares changed hands. It compared with 21,931,559 last week.

The dull trading, analysts said, reflected continued doubt about the world situation—which includes the crisis in Cyprus and the Congo as well as Viet Nam—and also some hesitation about the U.S. presidential election.

The economic news, however, continued to be good. It included further increases in plans for capital spending by industry, a rise in industrial production to another new high, an increase in weekly steel output and a big gain in auto sales.

The Dow Jones industrial average last week rose 9.65 to 628.31.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks advanced 2.2 to 316.3.

Of 1,507 issues traded on the New York Stock Exchange, 884 advanced and 470 declined.

The rise was slow in getting under way. On Monday prices were mixed as volume sank to the lowest level in a year. Wall Street was not yet reassured that the United States might not be involved in a major military crisis, possible with China, over North Viet Nam.
